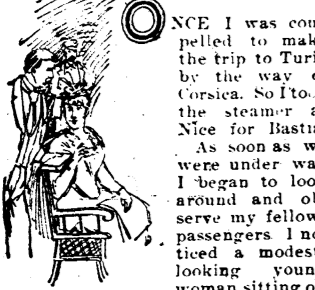

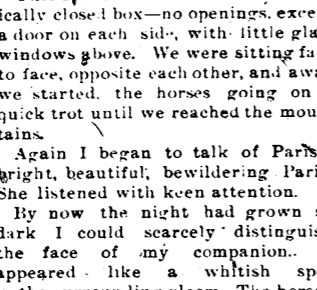
As we spoke of residences, and places we preferred, I asked: "How do you like Paris?"

Capt. Martini as Elephant.

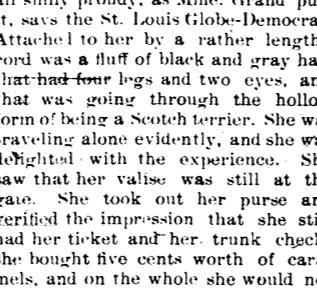
