There was no evidences that they had been awakened, and their death was undoubtedly caused by suffocation.

WEEKLY REVIEW OF TRADE.

Exports of gald and witndrawals from the treasury have been almost entirely stopped by the contract for purchases of gold from Mesers. Belmont and Morgan.
