Oriental War News.

Chicago. It is reported that Li Hung Chang and Prince Kung, the Chinese peace envoys, will be met by the Japanese representatives at Shimonoseki, in the southwestern part of the island of Nippon, the largest island of Japan.

Hiroshima. Field Marshal Count Oyama reports that he met the enemy near Taping chin and defeated them. He adds that on February 24, 43,000 Chinese troops attacked Hai Chung, but were repulsed and retreated toward Yiu Kuo. The Japanese lost 20 killed and 256 wounded. The enemy lost 200 killed. The number of Chinese wounded is not known.

Shanghai. It is reported that Li Hung Chang and Prince Kung, the Chinese peace envoys, will be met by the Japanese representatives at Shimonoseki, in the southwestern part of the island of Nippon, the largest island of Japan.

Hiroshima. Official dispatches state that on Feb. 28 the Japanese completed the occupation of the district of Salo which the Chinese retreated slowly north after the encounter, in which the Japanese lost 98 killed and wounded and the Chinese 55 killed. On the same morning a Chinese attack on the Japanese line at Hai Cheng was easily repulsed.

Yokohama. The captured Chinese warships have arrived here and the reports of the Japanese commanders are favorable to the raising of the sunken war vessels of China at Wei Hai Wei. The Japanese have abandoned the Shantung peninsula, intended for Hai Wei, after destroying the fortification on the mountain.

Li Hung Restored to the Emperor's Favor. Li Hung Chang telegraphed the details of his commission and papers as Chinese peace envoy to Japan, saying that if they were satisfactory he would not start on his journey to Japan.

Li Hung Chang started for Hiroshima by way of Tien Tsin. Wang Tung Ho, tutor to the emperor of China, who has been regarded as a big stumbling block to modern progress, has inquired the dismissal of the emperor, and a number of other high officials have been dropped.

Li Hung Chang met with special marks of royal esteem and was granted five audiences with the emperor and two with the empress. Hon. John W. Foster, secretary of state, is on his way to Hongkong, accompanied Li Hung.
