FACTS ABOUT PUTTY. How It Is Made and Its Many Tinte

and Uses Pure putty is made of whiting and linseed oil. Whiting is made of chalk which is imported from England and ground in this country. Barytes, mixed with the whiting is used as an adulterant of putty, and cottonseed oil is mixed with the linseed oil. Cot tenseed is cheaper, and a slower dryer than linseed; its use is advantageous to small customers, for putty mixed with part cottonseed oil keeps

Linseed oil putty is used more by decorators and painters and other large consumers who use up putty quickly. Putty sells at wholesale from one and one-half to two cents a pound. It is put up for the trade in barrels of 800 pounds, kegs of 300 pounds, tubs of 100 to 110 pounds, incans of one to 100 pounds, and in Cigarette league. bladders: it keeps best in bladders, and the bulk of the putty exported to be established in the university of goes in that form. Brown putty is used to point brown stone buildings and putty sometimes used in pointing up brick buildings. Black putty is used in stove foundries. Plumbers use putty. Sometimes scene painters reduce it and put it on canvas to paint over. There are three or four putty manufacturies in New York and more in Brooklyn. A single firm of manufacturers in that city has sold more than 17,000 tons in a year. These seem like large figures, but they are ess surprising from the fact that there are few-articles of more common use

HE WILL MAKE RUBBER. A Frenchman's Important Discovery and

How It Will Help Mankind M: Berthelot, a noted French savant and one of the most distinguished of synthetic chemists, has just announced that he is on the

trail of a most important discoverythe production by artificial means of chemically pure crude rubber. The synthetic chemist first reduces natural products, such as minerals, oils, waters, etc., to their elements, and then endeavors to recombine them in their original form, improving on na ture by emitting all impurities. In this line of investigation, says the New York World, the French chemists have produced artificial diamonds. sapphires and rubies that deceived the expert, a feat long regarded as beyond the bounds of science. Now they are turning their attention to some of the more important raw materials entering into manufacturing articles. The rubber industry offered a field for their enterprise. The increase in the uses and adaptations of rubber has been something enormous, and with that increase has come a growing scarcity of the crude material. Most of the crude rubber comes from South America, and the immense quantity of sap taken from the trees has affected their vitality. Many of the large and more productive trees are dying and it will be many years before the young trees will be sufficiently grown to yield sap.
