VESSELS WRECKED. Heavy Storm Brings Disaster to Many Craft on the Lakes.

The sudden change from balmy fall to gruff and chilling winter was accompanied by a howling northwester which swept over the Great lakes in a fury. Many vessels had been warned of an approaching storm and remained in shelter, but numerous others faced the wind and wave and several suffered

the wind and wave and several sunered severely as a consequence.

A dispatch from Charlevoix, states that fishermen at the point two miles north reported wreckage coming ashore. One jacket life preserver was marked "Corning." Parts of a vessel's gunwale and cabin were also picked up. It is presumed to be from the Ida Corning which passed Port Huron bound up Nov. 16 in tow of the steamer (Iscoda, since when there is no record scoda, since when there is no record of her whereabouts She is owned by Corning & Byan, of Saginaw. She carried a crew of seven men.

The presence of a large fleet of foreign war vessels in Salonica bay evidently had the effect of somewhat awakening Sultan Abdul Hamid II from his lethargy for a time at least and he made a pretense of restoring order in the provinces where the slaughter of Armenian and other Christians had occurred. The powers delayed any action they may have meditated to see if the sultan was sincere in his promises. There has been little change in the nature of the problem before the powers, however. Their mutual suspicions are acting as drags upon them and delay decided action upon their part, though the belief still prevails that nothing short of drastic measures will bring the sultan to terms for any length of time. The general situation continues to inspire the gravest fears. Telegrams from Marash and Marsovan say that the American and other missionaries there are in the greatest danger. THE FIGHTING IN CUBA.

asurgents Capture Two Ports-Horrible Butchery of Women by Spanish Troops. A letter from Havana gives details of atrocities in Matanzas province. Col. Melino, who commands a Spanish regiment, was recently forced to retreat by the insurgents. On their way the Spaniards met a group of 10 women and a dozen children near a little town of Cayopino. One of the women made a sucering remark, whereupon the soldiers butchered whereupon the soldiers butchered every one of them. After shooting down their victims, the Spaniards stabbed them with bayonets, inflicting

down their victims, the Spaniards stabbed them with bayonets, inflicting the most horrible wounds.

Gen. Maximo Gomez, the insurgent leader who recently entered the province of Santa Clara, captured Fort Paleyo, on the river Zaza, in the province of Santa Clara. No details are given of the engagement. While a train conveying tien. Smarez Valdez was nearing Santa Rita, the insurgents fired a dynamits shell. The explosion blew up four wagons and the engine of the train. The soldiers were seriously injured and 12 others slightly wounded. There have been several skirmishes in the provinces of Santiago de Cuba, during which the insurgents had 15 killed, four wounded and lost one prisoner. The troops lost 10 killed and had 13 wounded.

An insurgent detachment, under the leadership of Biamonte, has attacked Fort Fluriach in the Santa Cruz district of the province of Puerto Principe. After an hour's firing the insurgents retreated. Later details from Santa Clara show that the town of Guina de Miranda, the most important in the district, has been entirely burned by the insurgents commanded by Roloff. A majority of the brick houses of the place and 50 palm hufs were destroyed. Before the revolution the town had 4,500 inhabitants.






