The South African Situation is Becoming Very Serious and the British in Matabeland are in Great Danger-England and Germany May Have a Squabble.

An official dispatch from Bulawayo, Matabeland, says that it is impossible to estimate the numbers of the enemy. The whote country is now in the hands of the rebellious natives and they are massing in great forces northward. No official statement from any source is werth considering for a moment if No official statement from any source is worth considering for a moment if it takes the ground that Buluwayo is not in danger. The latest advices received from Buluwayo have greatly increased the anxiety felt for the safety of that place. It has been stated that Buluwayo is held by 1,000 men; this is not correct. The aumber of sighting men at Buluwayo is under 900, and of this small number, compared with the 15,000 Matabeles in the wicinity of the town, 300 are reported woninty of the town, 300 are reported woninty of the town, 300 are reported to have been dispatched to beld Man-gwe pass, which is a steep delle, with angular turnings and can be rendered ampregnable, and which is absolutely mecessary to prevent all entside com-munications being cut off from Bulu-ways. Then, again, large mumbers of Matabeles, presumed to be friendlies, Magnetes, presumed to be friendles, have, by some excuse or other, succeeded inventering the town, and it is well-known that they have planned to rise and strike at the British as soonasthe warriors of the Matabeles are huard outside the line of defenses. Spain is aware that President Cleveland wishes to become conciliatory, but that he cannot anwer for the control of American opin ion if the struggle in Cuba be pro-longed to the injury of American com-merce. Spain, on the other hand, has informed President Cleveland that she is willing to conciliate the sympathies of sensible Americans, but that she cannot entertain a proposal for the independence of Cuba, or even for a suspension of hostilities to negotiate with the rebels, as public opinion would never to elegate such a humilistic. never tolerate such a humiliation.

POLITICAL CONVENTIONS.

Massachusetts Democrats held an enthusiastic convention, endorsing President Cleveland's administration, but naming ex-Gov. Wm. E. Russell as their choice for the presidential nomination to be his successor. The platform demands the maintenance of the gold standard and opposes the free coinage of silver; demands the withdrawal of legal tender notes issued in time of war; recommends the admission of raw material free, of duty; demands the suppression of trusts and the regula-tion of monopolies, and further reform of the civil service; sympathizes with Cuba; declares disapproval of the A. P A. without naming the order; indorses the Monroe doctrine.

The state convention of Rhode Island Democrats indorsed ex-Gov. Russell, of Massachusetts, for president, The platform indorses Cleveland's ad-




