### Care for Dipatheria.

We clip the following from one of ou esteemed contemporaries and publish it for what it is worth. We would advise, however, sending for doctor as soon as you think you have a case of diphtheria, and you can try the following before he arrives, as it is necessary to work quick in

such cases. "Should any of your family be attacked with diphtheria, do not be alarmed, as it is usually and speedily cured without doctor. When it was raging in Eugland a few years ago, Dr. Fields performed many wonderful cures, while the patients of others were dropping off on all sides. The remedy to be so rapid must be simple. All he took with him was powdered sulphur and a quill, and with these he cured every patient without exception. He put a teaspoonful of flour of brimstone into a wine glass of water and stirred it with his finger instead of a spoon as the sulphur does not readily amalgamate with water. When the sulphur was well mixed he gave it as a gargie, and in ten minutes the patient ess out of danger. Brimstone kills every cies of fungue in man, beast and plant in a very short time. Instead of spitting out the gargle, he recommended the bying of it. In extreme cases in show he had been called just in the nick of time, when the fungus was too nearly closing to allow the gargling, he blew the sulphote through a quilt into the patient's throat and after the faugus had shrunk

po of it, then the graphing.

"If the patient cannot gargle, take a live coal, put it on a shovel and sprinkle specular two of flour of brimstone at a time upon it; let the sufferer inhale it, holding the head over it, and the fungus will die. If plentifully used, the whole room may be filled almost to suffocation, and the patient can walk about in it, inhaling the fumes, with doors and windows closed. The mode of fumigat. ing a room with sulphur has often cured the most violent attacks of cold in the head, chest, etc., at any time, and is recommended in cases of consumption and

New Rules for the Government of Part ies doing Busine-s at Probate Office.

Probate Judge Newkirk has handed us the following new rules for the government of parties doing business at the probate office during his term of office: He says that during his term of office bere must be no smoking in his c room during the hearing of cases. This has been allowed in times past, but he says he must draw the line, and hopes those who have business there will respect his wishes in the matter.

He has also made a change in the practice of filing final accounts. Hereofore it has not generally been filed until the day of hearing, necessitating in many cases an adjournment with attendant costs and trouble, to allow opposing parties time to examine the same and file objections. He now requires the account to be filed when notice is given that it is ready to be rendered, so that during the period of advertising opportunity is given for examining the same by any one that is interested, so that there need be no de-

lay or adjournment at the day of hearing. He has also instituted a system of scrap books in which the legal notices of each ounty paper are pasted for reference one book for each paper, thus enabling one to find what they wish instantly, instead of being obliged to look over a year's newspapers to find the advertise

es was a law-giver, Daniel was a prince, Isaiah a courtier, and David a king; but Amos, the author of my text, as a peasant, and, as might be supearly all his parallelisms are storal, his prophecy full of the odor of new mown hay, and the rattle of lo-custs, and the rumble of carts with sheaves, and the roar of wild beasts devouring the flock while the shepherd came out in their defense. He watched the herds by day, and by night in-habited a booth made out of bushes so that through these branches he could see the stars all night long, and was more familiar with them than we who have tight roofs to our houses, and hardly ever-see the stars except among the tall brick chimneys of the great But at seasons of the year when the herds were in special danger. he would stay out in the open field all through the darkness, his only shelter the curtain of the night-heaven, with the stellar embroideries and silvered

ssels of lunar light.
What a life of solitude, all alone with his herds! Poor Amos! And at twelve o'clock at night, hark to the bark, and the llon's roar, and the bear's growl, and the owrs te-whit te-who, and the serpent's hiss, as he unwittingly steps too near while moving through the thickets! So Amos, like other herdsmen, got the habit of studying the map of the heavens, because it was so much of the time spread out before him. He noticed ne stars advancing and others receding. He associated their dawn and setting with certain seasons of the year He had a poetic nature, and he read night by night, and month by month, and year by year, the poem of the con-stellations, divinely rhythmic. But two settes of stars especially attracted attention while seated on the ground, or lying on his back under the open scrol of the midnight heavensthe Piciades or Seven Stars, and Orion. The former group this rustic prophet sociated with the spring, as it rises about the first of May. The latter he associated with the water, as it comes to the meridian in January. The Pleiades, or Seven Stars, connecte sweetness and joy; Orion, the herald of the tempest. The ancients were the more apt to study the physiognomy and juxtaposition of the heavenly bodies, hecause they thought they had a special influence upon the earth; and per-haps they were right. If the moon every few hours lifts and lets down the tides of the Atlantic ocean, and the lectric storms in the sun, by all scientific admission, affected the earth, why not the stars have proportionate effect? And there are some things which nake me think that it may not have been all superstitution which connect-

e movements and appearance of the heavenly bodies with great moral events on earth. Did not a meteor run on evangelistic errand on the first Christmas night, and designate the stars in their course fight against Sisera? Was it merely coincidental that before the destruction of Jerusalem the nights? Did it merely happen so that new star appeared in constellation Casseonela, and then disappear just before Charles IX. of France, who was responsible for St. Bartholomew massacre, died? Was it without significance that in the days of the Roman Emperor Justinian war and famine were pre ed by the dimners of the sun, which for nearly a year gave no more light than the moon, although there were no clouds to obscure it?
Astrology, after all, may have been

omething more than a brilliant heathstism. 


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
