

#### A New Means of Sterilization. One of the simplest and most thor-

can be used is by means of heat. One

of the difficulties in the use of this means is that the articles may be spoiled, especially where the heat is long continued. Baking or placing articles in dry heat for any length time is not only an unreliable method, but attended with the danger of fire if a degree of heat is sufficiently thorough to sterilize them. Boiling or steaming are objectionable because most things would be rendered useless from the contact with moisture. Experiments have proven that hot oil is one of the best sterilizers known, especially for instruments. One of our ost eminent surgeons has demonstrated the fact that the most complete sterilizing follows the dipping of surgical instruments into boiling olive oil One may determine the temperature of the oil by a very simple process of dropping bread crumbs into the oil. When they turn brown and crisp the oil is hot enough for the surgeon's This is much more convenient than using the thermometer, which may not always be at hand. The oil may be heated over a spirit lamp, and a few spoonfuls will be sufficient for sterilzing the instruments used in some o the more simple operations.

#### Devices for Detaching Horses


Of late quite a number of inventions have been put out, the object of which is to detach a runaway horse from the vehicle. Many advantages are claimed for this idea in its various forms. A careful overlooking, however, of the subject does not warrant very enthusiasm as to the invention. In the first place, no horse should be allowed to run away This assertion does not. of course, apply to sudden accidents or frights where horses are sure to become unmanageable almost on the instant, and may overturn or plunge into any obstruction before the driver has time or opportunity to get them under control. The idea of suddenly detaching the horse at full speed is a most unpractical one. If the vehicle were running on a tramway where the momentum would carry it only in a straight line this might do. It would be on the same principle of breaking the coupling of a car. But on any ordinary road, however good, a wheel of the ve hicle might, while still going at a high rate of speed, strike a stone or any triffing obstruction and throw it out of line, precipitate it into a ditch or cap-

size it altogether. Inexperienced horsemen are warned against any device that professes to bring safety by detaching the horse when at a high rate of speed. If one vere likely to run into the ocean, down an embankment or into a railway train. the detaching device might be of bene fit, but the chances are that it would precipitate a calamity instead of avert-

The islands of the Philippine archipelago are described by Sir John Bow-ring as "innumerable." Other authorities variously estimate them at from 400 to 1,200 in number. The eleven most important, embracing some 95 per cent of the total area (computed at 114,350 square miles), and the great mass of the population are Luzon, Min-danao, Negros, Panay, Mindoro, Cebu. Samar, Leyte, Palawan, Bojol and Masfrom east to west, and covers 141/2 degrees of latitude and 9 degrees of longitude. Luzon and Mindanao together exceed all the other islands combined. Manila, the capital, situated on the west coast of Luzon is in latitude 14 degrees 36 minutes north and longitude 120 degrees 57 minutes east. The characteristics and present attitude of the Indians of the Philippine are illustrated by the insurrection which was initiated in August, 1896. and has since continued. There had been previous similar risings, notably one in 1872, but none where the insurgents were so numerous or formidable The moving causes of this outbreak are to be found in the oppressive taxes, excises, license fees, and other burdens imposed by the government and ened by extortionate officials, among which, besides the grievous and unrea sonable pecuniary mulcts, was the corvee of forty days' labor for public purposes which every man was compelled annually to furnish. The grievance of the taxes was aggravated by the usu rious loans to which the natives were compelled to submit to raise money and especially by the confiscations of property which were resorted to where the dues claimed were not satisfied. The authority to confiscate placed a great power in the hands of unscrupulous officials, who used it corruptly against the more prosperous for the purpose of extorting money. These grievances became so general that a secret Revolutionary Society or League was formed, which by August, 1896, rose to the proportions of army of 50 000 men. Cavite being the center of the revolt. The original rebels were joined by deserters from the army vagabonds and escaped criminals. In the course of their conflicts with the forces of the government, which was instructed from Madrid to show no mercy, a spirit of atrocious inhumanity was developed on both sides, and a sayage destruction of life ensued. The killing of prisoners captured or surrendered, smothering of captives in dungeons, burning alive, mutilation and dsemboweling were practiced by both, without any regard to the usages of civilized warfare. The Spaniards, to extort confessions, resorted to the thumbscrew and revived the tortures of the Inquisition. Their proceedings were claimed to be Justified by the pica of retaliation, but no law or exigency could justify retaliation pushed to a point so malignant and brutal. its fatal impolicy is shown by the fact that the insurrection has not been suppressed, but is suspended only.

FIREMEN AT OMAHA.

The National Firemen's association will hold a national tournament on the Trans - Mississippi grounds at Omaha, Sept. 5 to 10.

Prizes amounting to \$10,000 in value are offered by the National Firemen's association, and a similar amount will be expended by the exposition directors in the erection of buildings and preparation of the grounds for the tournament. Several structures will also be erected for the express purpose of being set on fire to give the laddies a chance to do some real fire fighting.

The railroads have agreed to make very low rates for the tournament, and it is expected that 50,000 firemen and their friends will be in attendance.

The national firemen's tournament was held at Chicago 20 years ago. At that time there were but two state firemen's associations in the country, whereas there is now one in nearly every state. The tournament to be held in Omaha will be very much more elaborate than was attempted at Chicago in 1878. There will be three times as many contests and a very much larger number of competing companies and it is probable that nearly every state in the union will be represented by one or more companies.
