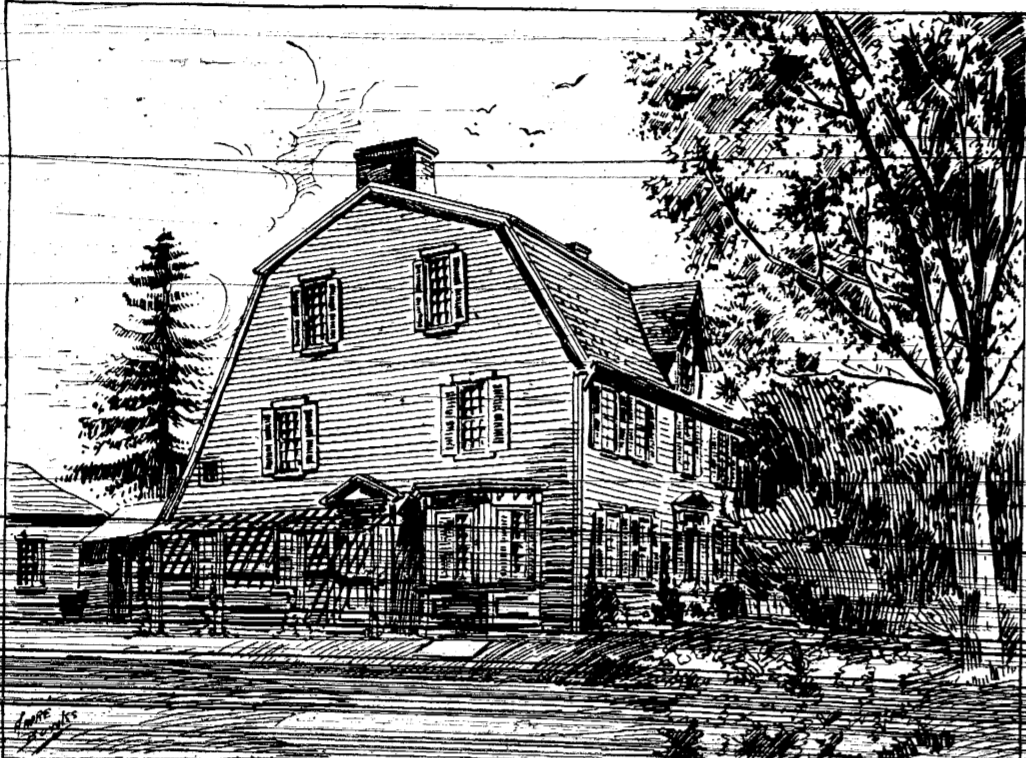

If a popular vote could be taken, it would probably be established that in the minds of the American people the greatest author America has ever produced is Nathaniel Hawthorne. Certainly no greater novel than "The Scarlet Letter" has ever been produced by any man in this country. The Boston publisher, to whom the MS. of "The Scarlet Letter" was submitted, at once recognized its great strength and power and brought it out in 1850, when 5,000 copies were sold in two weeks. The book made Hawthorne from a position of humble obscurity to the front rank of living novelists, and he has remained in that position ever since.

He was a man of a high order of intellect, with a loud roar of accomplishment, but rather with a still, small voice and forth in the world that "thought preferable to my old solitude."
The place most intimately associated with Hawthorne, next to Salem, is Concord, Mass., to which town Hawthorne removed immediately after his marriage in 1842. Here he took up his residence in the Old Manse, one of the most historic houses in New England, a house still standing and looking exactly as it looked when Hawthorne lived there. It is now owned by the state and is open to the public.
