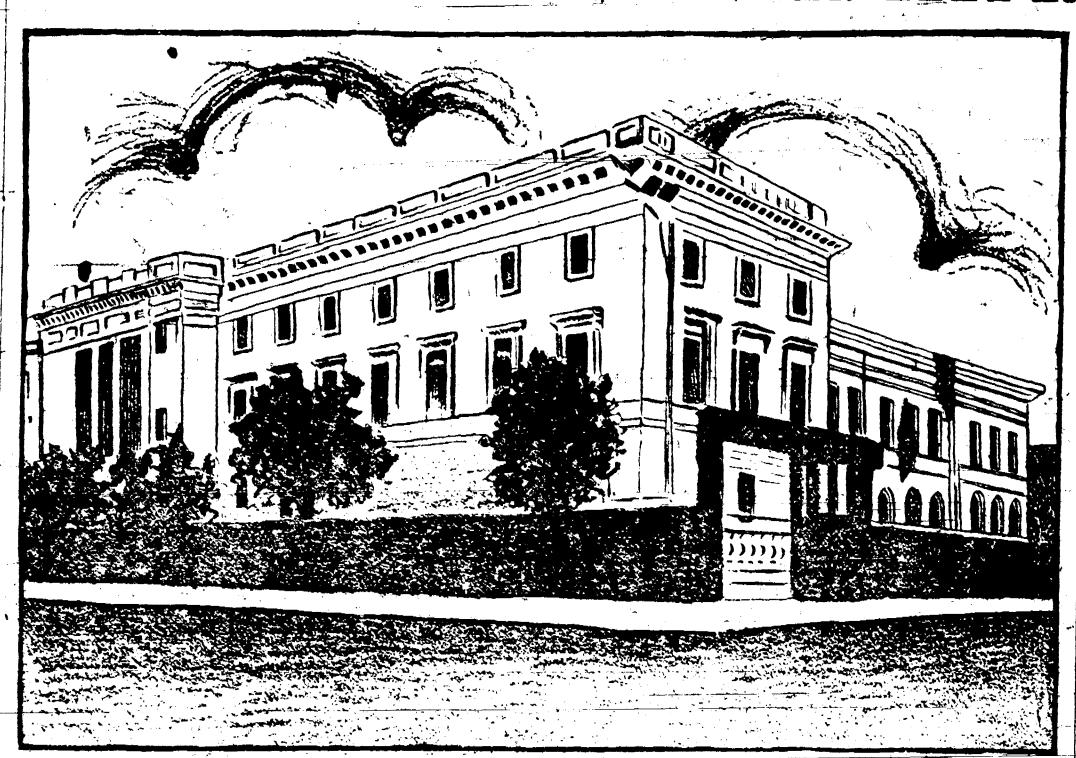


A NEW MINT AT PHILADELPHIA.
