BEGGAR KINGS.
Tribute Upon Rich and Poor and Are Obeyed with Alacrity.
If you want to grow rich in China become the head of a guild of beggars, thieves or lepers, says the London Express. Nankin, Peking and Tientsin are the headquarters of the most powerful of these guilds, and their rulers are wealthy and respected. The "king" of a clan of Chinese vagabonds of these classes derives his income from a tribute rendered him by his wretched subjects, and also levies a sort of blackmail on traders and merchants, stores and houses free from the particular pests which he controls. From these two sources he realizes a large income and keeps up great style in his mode of life. Each clan has a particular district of the city given over to its operation, beyond which its members are forbidden to stray. Horrible self-mutilations are practiced by the beggars of China in order that their deformities may excite compassion and lead to profit. If you see a blind man soliciting alms in a Chinese street it is ten to one that he has himself destroyed his sight. On certain days the beggars go about in gangs of from fifty to 150. On these occasions shopkeepers are only too glad to comply with the "king's" demands for blackmail in order that his subjects may be kept out of their shops. A king of Chinese thieves knows everything that goes on in his district. He knows who committed certain thefts and where the stolen property is. He, like his brother of the beggars, has a double source of income. A large percentage of the profits made by his subjects is claimed by him, and he betrays them if they attempt to cheat the autocrat. And if a foreigner is robbed he generally can, by paying the "king" a certain sum, recover his property. Property stolen from Chinamen is never brought back. Every Chinese city has a leper house outside its gates, and most of them have two or more. As in the cases of the beggars and thieves, there is an executive head, called the "king" of the lepers, who controls all lepers and makes rules and compacts, which must be observed. These unfortunate are numerous throughout the empire. When in the first stage of the disease they are brought to the leper houses. Good care is taken of them as long as their relatives can meet the demands of the "king." But no matter how wealthy their families may be the "king" evidently drains them of every penny, and both the leper and his relatives often have to turn beggars. The poorer lepers are devoted to miserable, unclean huts, providing poor shelter against bad weather.

IN AUSTRALIA.
Baseball Popular There, Due to Effort of Resident Americans.
Baseball is becoming popular in Australia, says the London Mail, and possibly some day Australians will be as eminent in this sport as they are at present on the cricket field. It is largely owing to the efforts of the many Americans settled in the antipodes that the game is becoming rapidly acclimated. Recently began the first series of inter-colonial baseball matches, the contestants being Victoria and New South Wales, both of which colonies possess organized baseball associations. The games were played in Sydney and the home nine won two out of three. The New South Wales side included Victor Trumper, M. A. Noble and J. J. Kelly, members of the last Australian cricket team to visit England, and among the Victorians was another member of that team, Frank Larner. Donnan of the 1897 Frank Larner was selected as the emergency player of New South Wales. Local Americans say that wonderful proficiency was displayed, although as yet some of the finer points of the game remain to be learned.

Two Horses from Queen.
The queen herself has on two occasions at least, been called upon to pay horsehoe "rent quitance," similar to that which the city corporation renders to the Crown each year. Oakham, in Rutland, possesses a unique and regular privilege, by virtue of which any peer of the realm passing within the precincts of the manor has to pay tribute in the form of a horsehoe, and if he refuses he is obliged to give money, which the bailiff is empowered to take by force. Strictly speaking, the shoe should come from one of his own horses, but the alternative of payment in hard cash is usually chosen. The money being devoted to purchasing ornamental horsehoes to decorate the castle walls. Many of these articles, including two from her majesty, given when she visited the county first as Princess Victoria and again some five-and-twenty years ago, and one apiece from Queen Elizabeth and George IV.—London Telegraph.

"Shot-Hole Bore."
Peach trees in the vicinity of St. Joseph, Mich., are threatened by a more dangerous enemy than the yellow. Local growers call it "shot-hole bore." Little white insects with red heads invade the orchards and cover the trees with tiny holes, the sap leaks out from these holes and the trees die for lack of nourishment. An expert local fruit grower was surprised when notified of the supposed existence of this disease. He says: "It is common in Van Buren county, but I had not heard of its spreading to Berrien."

Bees in Prisoner's Cell.
John Bunch, a pioneer citizen of Macon county, Missouri, is suing the town of La Plata for injuries alleged to have been received while in the calaboose at that place last August. He was arrested for some trivial cause and found on being locked up that he had for cellmates an active and exceedingly indignant hive of bees. The insects regarded him as an intruder and stung him severely during his six hours of confinement.

London cable New York World: James Thompson, aged 33 years, has been in a trance for eight months at the Royal Infirmary, Newcastle. He merely took to bed, refused nourishment and was admitted to the infirmary, apparently paralyzed. Since then he has been kept alive by liquid nourishment, artificially administered. He never moves, and has never displayed the slightest sign of life except on two occasions, when his eyes, which are open with a perfectly vacant expression, betrayed a faint transient sign of mental consciousness. The case is without a precedent in English medical science. The hypothesis of shamming has been disposed of by prolonged tests of every conceivable kind.

DIRT EATERS.
The Grasshoppers in the West Indies Have Many of Them.
"You can't convince the coolie of the Grenadine Islands, West Indies, that there is any harm in eating dirt. His own diseases ought to convince him, but they don't. The rest of their diet is simple and meagre. For the most part they are vegetarians. They eat rice, peas, curry and ghee, especially prepared butter in great use. Most professing vegetarians do not exclude from their diet milk and eggs, except when they are in hospital, and forced to do so. To hard workers in the cane fields under a scorching tropical sun a diet of this kind cannot be supposed to be productive of health robustness. And when to this sort of food is added the luxuries of dirt eating, it is no wonder that these coolies are bloodless and stiff-jointed. These ills are characteristic of the race."
Coolie patients in the English hospitals of Carriacou, one of the Grenadine Islands, frequently are found to have gravel hidden in their clothing, and they cry and beg for it like the morphine eater for his dope. This stuff which they eat is a soft, slate-colored or grayish stone. Sometimes the pulverized dirt is made into cakes. If there isn't much of this to be had, the coolies eat rags, paper and coke. A coolie who is well along in the art of dirt eating is swollen all over the body, and the muscles of his legs are tense. His face is puffy and has a distressing look of weariness and premature age. He is short of breath, and is unable to speak; so that he has to make signs to indicate his condition. His tongue is swollen and flabby and lies in the floor of his mouth, from which he cannot raise it, from pure weakness. It is marked strongly with impressions of the teeth. The complexion is pasty.

NOT PROFANE.
One May Speak of a Tinker's Dam With-out Profanity.
There is no profanity in saying that any certain thing "is not worth a tinker's dam," although it is so considered by many. The expression originated many years ago, when tinkering, or mending leaky tin vessels, was much cruder than it is now. In former times the use of rosin to check the flow of solder when placed on tin was not generally understood—at least by the roving tinkers. When one of these gentlemen of the road found a job, such as mending a wash boiler or other tin household utensil, he would get from the housewife or domestic a piece of soft dough. With this he would build a dam around the place where he intended to put his solder. Inside of the circle thus formed he poured the melted lead. When the metal cooled he would break away the dam of dough that had confined it to the desired limits. The heat had hardened the heavy paste and baked it thoroughly, so it was absolutely of no use for anything else.
