Senator Proctor's Cousin

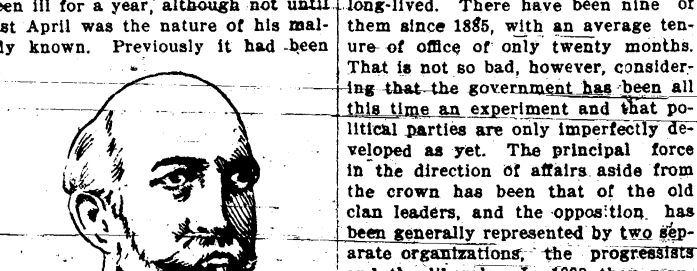
Senator Proctor's cousin, who has just acquired the celebrated Carrara marble quarries of Italy, has been referred to as the "big game" in control of the entire output of superior marble in the world. He is now in Italy closing the deal, which will make him the owner of the quarry which has been the source of the marble used in the Transvaal, which has been so much in evidence in Paris, the Gauls say, the result of four colors—green, blue, white, and red, each of them recalling the four little independent states which, before 1800, formed the Transvaal, the Republics of Lydenburg, Utrecht, Zoutspanberg, and Potchefstroom.

The Cotton Right

The cotton right, which is the subject of the Department of Agriculture in doing with the cotton "right" which is seriously affecting some of the southern states, says Guy B. Mitchell from Washington. Effort has been made to find a variety of cotton which would stand the blight and though such a plant has not been discovered, trial has shown that some varieties are a thousand per cent more resistant than others—on a scale of 1,000, the most resistant made 60 points against only 45 points for the least resistant—that is, the disease affected ten times as many of the latter variety as it did of the former. It is expected in time to secure, by selection, plants which will prove practically immune to this disease.

New Government in Japan

It is only about two months since the present Japanese cabinet was formed, and already one of its members, Toru Hoshi, minister of communications, has resigned. It is believed that the resignation may hasten the overthrow of the cabinet as a whole. Though the reasons for it seem to have been purely personal rather than political, the minister having become involved in certain financial scandals. Japanese cabinets are not long-lived. There have been nine of them since 1885, with an average tenure of only twenty months. That is not so bad, however, considering that the government has been all this time an experiment and that political parties are only imperfectly developed as yet. The principal force in the direction of affairs aside from the crown has been that of the old clan leaders, and the opposition has been generally represented by two separate organizations, the progressives and the liberals. In 1888 they managed to overcome their mutual distrust so far as to form both a coalition and a ministry, but the latter was short-lived. It lasted just four months, and then there was a reaction which brought in the cabinet of Marquis Yamagata, which continued in office until October of this year, or during a term of twenty-two months.

The Chinese Industry

Sir Robert Hart, director of the Chinese maritime customs, has written a letter to the Pekin correspondent of the Paris Temps pointing out that the Chinese will be unable to comply with demands for an enormous indemnity. According to the terms of the latest convention, the Chinese will be called upon to pay a money indemnity to all the governments, societies, companies, and individuals that suffered losses in the Boxer riots. Though no definite total is named, Sir Robert Hart estimates that when the indemnity is paid, it will be about \$200,000,000. He justly remarks that it would be difficult, if not impossible, to collect such an indemnity from China in its present crippled and disorganized condition.
