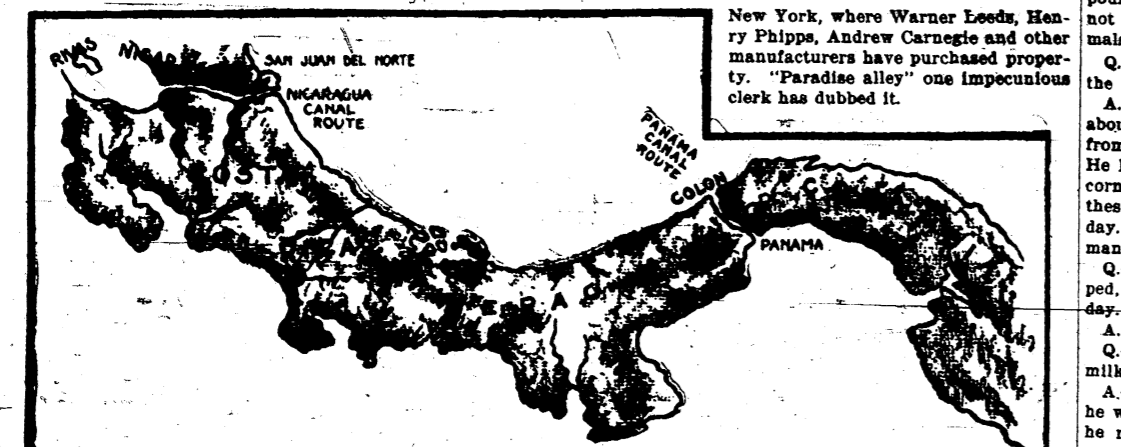




# MORGAN'S GREAT CANAL SCHEME.



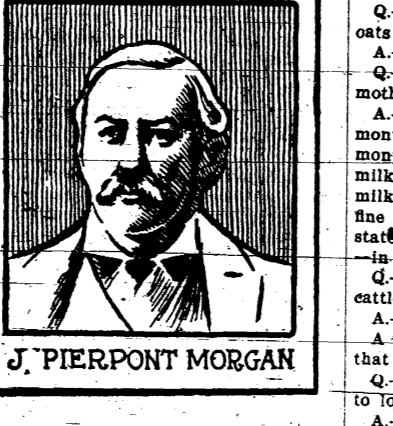
