Michigan Crops. The weather report issued Tuesday says that the weather conditions of the past seven days have been generally favorable in most counties; the warmer temperature having a decided effect on the growth of crops and the germination of late seedling.

Horribly Mangled. George Marlborough, a blacksmith living in Greenfield township, was run over Sunday night by car No. 20 of the Northwestern road, in front of his home.

Judge Chester, of Hillsdale, in the Calthoun county circuit court, issued an order postponing the case of the People vs. ex-Supt. of the Poor Hyde, until his physical condition improves.

Galesburg is to have rural free delivery.

Lake Odessa is to have fair grounds fitted up.

Detroit has on its books \$149,000 of back taxes.

Galesburg has one taxpayer who hands over \$720.

Five thousand fish books are sold in Alpena annually.

Prokopy is up in arms to become the county seat of Emmet.

Four rural mail delivery will be established in South Haven.

The postoffice at Ingersoll has been discontinued. Mail goes to Delta.

The postoffice at Ellis has been discontinued. Mail will go to Marshall.

The equalized valuation of Genesee county has been fixed at \$2,499,231.

Miss May Lawton, U. S. M., 1901, will go to the Philippine Islands as a teacher.

The So. line steamer Hennepin was damaged \$2,500 by fire in Buffalo Thursday.

Indiana capitalists are organizing a company to drill for oil near Three Oaks, Mich.

Some one poisoned eight head of cattle near Montague, belonging to Butcher and Horren.

Alfred William Balch, of Saginaw, has been appointed an assistant surgeon in the navy.

A Muskogean firm gets the contract for the addition to the Mt. Pleasant normal school for \$17,000.

One hundred and six applicants for teachers positions in Huron county wrote the examinations.

James Crozier, of Menominee, formerly commandant at the Soldiers' home, is seriously ill at Alma.

Thirty burglars in Bay City are out on a strike for a nine-hour day and 12 1/2 cent increase in wages.

The first smallpox patient in Bay City has been discharged. The epidemic has cost the county \$10,000.

A gold mining company, of which Gov. Bliss is president, is reported to have made a rich strike in Colorado.

Huron county has 38 liquor sellers yielding her the neat sum of \$16,000. Only six have refused to pay this year.

W. E. Scott, aged 70, who pleaded guilty to passing a forged check on a Brown bank, was sentenced to two years.

The increase in real property over last year in Adrian was but \$3,150,000 in personal \$8,424, making a total of \$11,578.

Promoters of an electric road, to connect at Adrian with the Toledo & Jackson line, are seeking a franchise in Hudson.

A stranger passed two forged checks for \$27 each in Albion Saturday. W. Schmeider and Hill and Allen were the victims.

Innumerable swarms of grasshoppers have invaded the hay crop in Martin township. Farmers say it is the poorest crop on record.

The assessed valuation of Washburn county this year is placed at \$33,332,700; a decrease of \$371,977 as compared with last year.

Under thermometers registered 102 in the shade Tuesday. An electrical storm in the evening put nearly all the lights out of business.

The Muskegon Traction and Lighting Company will increase the wages of its motormen and conductors about 20 cents a day on Aug. 1.

Lightning struck in numerous Michigan towns Tuesday. While considerable damage to property is reported, there was no loss of life.

Reblaire is now lighted by electricity. Work on the plant was begun two years ago, but was delayed by a change of village officials.

George W. Partridge, an old and respected citizen of Detroit for over a quarter of a century, was found dead in his bed Monday morning.

Will Arnell, the Beaverton murderer, has been brought to the Bay county jail for safekeeping and an extra watch will be kept over him.

The eighth annual meeting of sheriffs, chiefs of police and prosecuting attorneys of Michigan will be held in Muskegon, July 17 and 18.

David A. Elliott, of Greenville, aged 70, once prominent in the Michigan Democratic party, died Saturday in the Traverse City asylum, a raving maniac.

D. S. Etheridge, a Quincy farmer, made and sold in one month 4500 pounds of butter, the product of 14 Jersey cows, 7 of which were heifers, not yet 2 years of age.

The Oddfellows of Bellevue held a great reception Saturday. Fifty candidates took degrees. Officers were present from Battle Creek, Charlotte, Olivet and Marshall.

Two libel suits for \$20,000 each have been started against the Grand Rapids Democrat by the Old National bank and Cashier H. J. Hollister. The suits grew out of the water scandal.

Fruit in the vicinity of Lawton has been injured to a great extent recently. Some peach orchards will bear no fruit at all, while very few will produce more than half the usual crop.

The Epworth League of the fourth district, comprising the counties of Kent, Montcalm, Allegan and Ottawa, will hold a summer picnic at Ottawa Beach and Marquette park on Aug. 1.

Allegan has a unique club called the T. U. W. What the letters stand for is the club's secret. No one has been able to guess correctly, although many appropriate names have been suggested.

The club is composed of 13 maiden ladies and they meet on the 13th of each month for social sessions only.

The biggest patriotic blowout in the history of southwestern Michigan will be the carnival and celebration in Kalamazoo July 3 and 4 for which nearly \$3,500 has been raised; \$2,800 in cash and the balance in valuable prizes contributed by the merchants. It will be a twentieth century celebration.

A GREAT STRIKE ORDERED.

The Sheet Steel Workers and The Mammoth Trust.

A BATTLE ROYAL IS NOW ON.

Not a Strike For Wages but for Unionism Which will Bow to the Inevitable?

The Boast of the Amalgamated Association. A Busted Bank.

The Great Strike.

As a result of the refusal of the representatives of the American Steel Sheet Co. and the American Sheet & Tube Co. subsidiary companies of the great United States Steel Corporation, to sign the workers' new scale at Saturday's conference in Pittsburgh, the national headquarters of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers Sunday and Monday declaring a strike at all the plants of the two combines.

The great strike is now on, but it will be several days before its actual extent is known. At the outset, however, over 35,000 men will be involved. It will be after the 1st of July. Thus the association has almost a month to prepare for the coming struggle. It is the boast of the Amalgamated association officials that by that time they will control 50 per cent of the capacity of the combine's plants.

Gradually the plans of President J. Shafter of the Amalgamated association are being uncovered. Since the trouble in the We Deweer Wood mills in McKeesport a few months ago, the Amalgamated association has been actively engaged in breaking up the prevailing arrangement of the combine in operating part of their plants with non-union men and the others with union men. Mr. Shafter says that if this is not checked the life of the Amalgamated association is threatened for the combine will always work their union mills last.

This has aroused the indignation of the United States Steel Corporation. The scale for the American Tin Plate Co. has been signed. It is said, however, that in case the struggle continues, the Amalgamated association will call on these tin plate workers as a means of defense against the parent corporation, which they hold responsible for all disagreements.

The strike now threatened in the bar mills, following so closely upon that of the tin plate mills, has a most serious aspect and may spread to most of the other plants. Indeed, in some circles, it is predicted that the gigantic struggle that has been talked of since the organization of the United States Steel Corporation was formed is the one of breaking out that and that it is a more serious matter than many believe was probable.

The situation the greater corporation is placed in practically frees the independent plants from complicity in the battle. The fight is not for wages, but for organization. Either the Amalgamated association must bow to the will of the greater combine or else the greater combine will have to give up its non-union mills.

Sixteen Killed.

Sixteen persons were killed and about 50 injured in a wreck of train No. 3, the west-bound Washburn limited, which was wrecked at Peru, Pa., Tuesday. The dead are all unknown Italian emigrants en route to Colorado. Many of the injured undoubtedly will die. Two sections of train No. 3, one coming from Detroit and the other from Toledo, were consolidated in Peru into a train of 11 cars, making up the flyer for its journey to St. Louis. Having left Peru one hour late, the train was speeding westward at a high rate, when the engine plunged through a trestle which had been undermined by rains. The embankment on both sides of the little stream dropped at a sharp angle, and the train was hurled into the emigrant and day coaches, the best of the deaths and injuries occurred.

In an official report of the wreck made to President Ramsey it is stated that 13-Italians were killed, 3 probably fatally, and 11 seriously hurt and 31 slightly hurt and cut.

A Busted Bank.

The Sixth National Bank of New York closed its doors Thursday. The bank was custodian of the funds of the New York postoffice. When the account was opened the bank put up a \$250,000 government bond as security. The bank has on deposit \$200,000 of postal funds. It is said that the bank's heavy debt balance was a result of the news of the bank's embarrassment on Tuesday being telegraphed throughout the country. Interior institutions having agencies deposited with the Seventh district on the bank, and these drafts, all coming at the same time, were too much for the institution.

Some old Nevada mining claims left Mrs. Montague by her father are proving valuable. It is said they are worth \$250,000.

Gen. MacArthur has ordered 1,500 Filipino prisoners of war released in the Philippines on promise of peaceful behavior.

"Battle medals" to be given participants in the Santiazo naval campaign are to bear the head of Rear-Admiral Sampson.

The government will buy no more horses for use in the Philippines, owing to the cessation of active hostilities in the islands.

The state democratic executive committee of Pennsylvania has decided to hold the state convention at Harrisburg on Aug. 15.

STEAMER WRECKED.

The steamer Lusitania from Liverpool, June 18, for Montreal, having 500 passengers on board, was wrecked Tuesday night off Cape Ballard, on the coast of Newfoundland, about 60 miles south of St. Johns. The Lusitania was bound round Cape Race for Montreal, with a large cargo and a ship load of passengers. She mistook her course in a dense fog and went ashore. The passengers, who are mostly emigrants, were panic-stricken. They stampeded and fought for the lifeboats, but were overcome by the force of the waves, who secured control after great trouble and a prolonged struggle with the rougher element among the passengers, who used knives. The women and children were first landed and the men followed. The crew stood by the ship. There is a report that one boat was upset and 20 persons drowned. The women and children rescued were almost naked. Drenched with spray, they were pulled up the cliffs by the coast people. Some of the boats were demolished in the surf while attempting to land and many unfortunates occupants held on to the rocks, suffering with cold
