The Elk Rapids Murder.

The coroner's inquest over the body of Fritz Huegli, Elk Rapids, shot Priday by D. J. Dokey while raking hay on the land claimed by them both, developed the fact that Dokey ordered. Huegli of the land and shot in the air to scare him. When Huegli, who continued to work, drove around the field again Dokey ordered him to desist and shot the contents of the second barrel of the gun into the left side of Huegh's neck. Huegh' fell from the rake, his feet catching in the machine. He was dragged across the field until the team stopped. Then it was found he was dead and clutched in his hand was a half-cocked Smith & Wesson revolver. Tokey waived examination, and as retained Hon. W. H. Foster of Traverse City, as one of his counsel.






