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Boiler Explosion at Brooklyn.

At 3:40 p. m. Monday a terrific explosion occurred. The whole town shook and people thought a cyclone or an earth quake had occurred, but it suddenly dawned upon them that the boiler in the electric light plant had blown up and the plant is a total wreck.

Will Stimm the engineer stood in front of the dynamo and he was blown out into the street with the front of the building and was badly bruised and cut. It was at first thought he was in the ruins and great excitement prevailed.

Fire immediately started but was soon extinguished. The boiler weighing three tons shot upwards in a northwesterly course like a sky rocket and came crashing down through the roof of the masonic hall doing great damage. The public hall below is not so badly damaged but the new addition is a sorry looking affair.

A four inch pipe went straight through the hall and landed on Frank Miller's porch. Other pipes went into Martin's jewelry shop. Plate glass windows in nearly every store in town are shattered. Residences are marred with bricks, windows are broken and yards are full of debris of all kinds. Bricks went through residences just missing peoples heads and it seems a miracle no one was killed. Mrs. Cole living some distance away was struck by a brick and at first it was thought her limb was broken.

15 ladies were practicing for the "Spinsters Convention" on the stage below when the boiler struck. They escaped badly frightened though some were knocked down.

Leon Green proprietor of the plant arrived Tuesday morning. He has been at Reading all summer putting in an electric plant. He says it must have been a defective boiler and no blame is laid on the engineer.

One dynamo was not injured much and they are moving it to the foundry and expect to furnish lights soon. The loss to Green is \$3,000.

Leon Green's loss is \$6,000. He will not rebuild. The masons' loss is about \$1,200. They are at work repairing. Of course there was no insurance.
