HYDRAULIC SEPARATORS ARE OF LITTLE VALUE

From a government bulletin we take the following: Everything claimed for the hydraulic separator can be equal ly well done in a shot gun can, and if water below 40 degrees F., or ice can -be obtained to bring the temperature down to 40 degrees F., the thoroughness of separation will be far superior to separation by any hydraulic separator. The only case where there is an advantage in using the method is in milk from cows far advanced in lactation, and then the efficiency of the process is about equal to deep setting in ice. This method is no more efficient than the old-fashioned shallow pan setting, with the disadvantage of greatly increasing the volume of skim milk to be handled, and, in case hot water is used, as is sometimes advised there is the added inconvenience of the rapid gouring of the milk. If any dairyman wishes to try the method there is no patent to prevent him using the process to his heart's content.


