stepped from the train in Eskisehir and paused on the platform to listen to the call of the muezzin, whose words rolled forth in full tones and then in quivering notes, as he leaned over the lofty balcony of the nearest minaret.

Quickly our thoughts traveled backward to the days of Osman, the founder of the Turkish dynasty; for here we were in the center of what was Osman's first little kingdom and what was destined to become the nucleus of the Ottoman empire.

Both men and women for the most part wore the European costume, with the exception of fezes on the heads of the men and shawls thrown round the heads of the women.

This old city of Northern Cappadocia was for several years an awful warning to the Osmanlis of what was to be expected from the rapid progress of the Glauours in education and commercial power.

The houses of the people were just such as we were destined to see throughout the length of Asia Minor. The poor inhabitants lived in one-story houses built of sun-dried bricks, and no plaster or painted wood revealed the dingy mud color of exterior or interior.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL. LESSON VIII, AUG. 24, NUMBERS 13:26-14:4.

Report of the Spies—Golden Text. "Blessed is That Man That Maketh the Lord His Trust." Psalms 40:4—Notes on the Lesson.

The Israelites had now spent about fifteen months in God's wilderness training school. In wise and wonderful ways Jehovah had been teaching them great lessons of trust, duty, worship, obedience, temperance, progress. Now comes an examination to test their minds and hearts.

Spying out the Land. A Test of Courage. Num. 13:1-25. Having reached Kadesh Barnea, the threshold of Canaan, the spies beset the plan (Num. 13:1), because, though He wants them to rely on His word, He wants them also to see their own eyes.

Spying out Our Promised Land. Our life is like a wilderness journey, full of need the inspiration of hope and so He has set before us a Promised Land. Part of it is in this life—the satisfaction of duty done for Him; the approval of noble men. The best part of it is in the next life, and the Bible is full of forebodings.

CITIES OF PORTUGAL

(Special Letter.)
How this Portugal grows on one! A very terra incognita only two and a half days by steamer from London, or 48-hour by express from Paris.

As pretty a land as one could ask for—an interesting and courteous people, scenery to delight rather than astound, hotels—only a few, it must be admitted, quite up to date—with prices as low or lower than Switzerland or Italy.

I have seen just four Americans in my eight weeks in Portugal and her near islands, and perhaps a dozen English since I reached the mainland. My letter of credit, issued by an old and substantial London bank, gives just one place in all this country to draw money, which shows what its makers think of the probabilities.

Now, Coimbra alone is worth a journey across the Atlantic. Bussaco rivals the Hvarian Alps. Coimbra has at least as many charms as Heidelberg. Mafrã almost causes you to forget Escorial. Batalha is one of the great sights of the world.

The Moor left his impress, which will not soon be eradicated. The Goth perpetrated his fair hair and blue eyes over a large area. The purely Iberian race survives here and there unadulterated.

Coimbra—the summer residence of royalty and diplomacy—is less than 20 miles away and I must get there before Don Carlos if I intend to view the interior of the palaces.

The region in the government-owned hills of Bussaco are worth a page in themselves, instead of the trivial mention that can be allotted them here. The people are indebted for this splendid reservation—as they are for many more in Portugal—to the monks, who have such an unerring eye for grandeur and situation, and showed such taste in adorning the vast estates which they acquired.

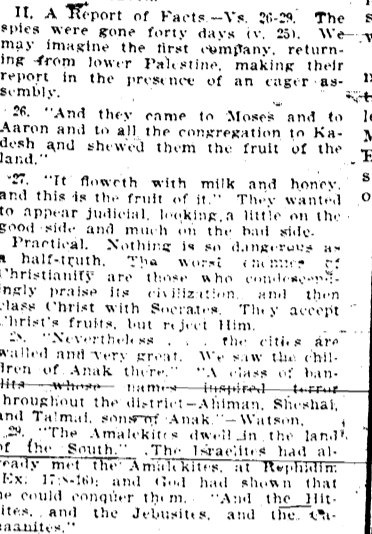

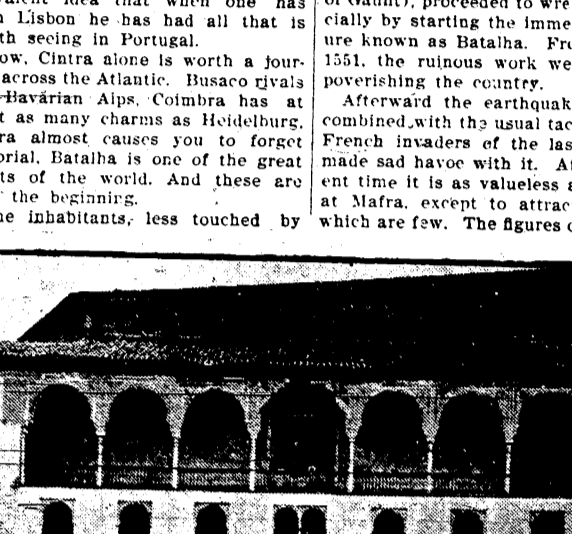

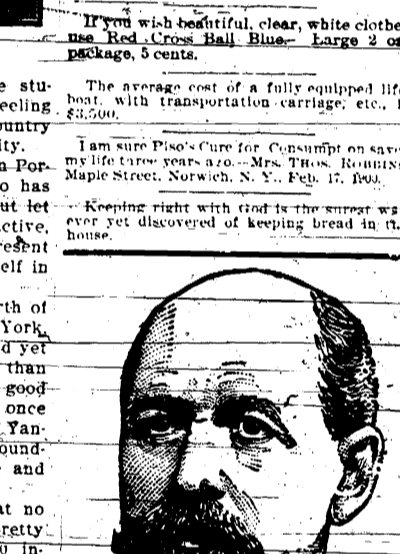

## Fishing at Hamlin Lake.

LUDINGTON, Mich., Aug. 9, 1902.

FRIEND MAT:—I came to this city on the 1st instant ostensibly for the purpose of attending the annual meeting of the Epworth League. Ludington is the western terminus of the Flint & Pere Marquette railroad in this state.

Hamlin lake is situated about five miles north of Ludington and less than a mile east of the great lake Michigan. It is about five miles long north and south and averages about three quarters of a mile in width east and west. Messrs Carter and Helling of Jackson have erected a large commodious hotel at Pacey Ridge on the south end of the lake which was well filled with guests when I was here for the first time, in fact, I could obtain a row-boat they being all taken by the patrons of the hotel.

Hamlin lake contains an abundance of fish pickerel predominating. There are also gamey musklonge, large and small-mouth bass, sheepheads, catfish, bullheads, wall-eyed pike, rock bass and the smaller varieties. I believe Hamlin lake contains more pickerel than any lake of size in the lower peninsula.

I found that as a rule they were using bon baits for trolling and though I was well supplied with them I thought I would try one of my weedless spinners baited with a frog-tied on the hook. As a result I had at the end of two hours being 14 pickerel and two bass the lot weighing about 40 pounds. I had fish being into the boat at the rate of one every seven minutes. I hardly knew what to do with them but I gave some of them to the boys at the lake, taking the balance to the boys in Ludington who were pleased to receive them. I leave for Grand Rapids today, thence for home well satisfied with my trip.
