The name of the postoffice at Colebrook, Gladwin county, has been changed to Billings.

Nashville has landed another industry—a steam pump works will give employment to 200 men.

Work on the gas plant for which a franchise was granted at Holland recently began at once.

The Pacific Express Co. offers \$2,000 reward for recovery of the bar of gold stolen from the depot in Detroit.

Michigan postmasters apparently are not superstitious. Their meeting will be held on Friday, Aug. 13, in Ludington.

Burlington is to build a jail for the village prisoners, and have a marshal to make some prisoners to put in the jail.

The books in the state treasury Saturday showed a balance considerably in excess of \$5,000,000, the largest in the history of the state.

A stock company with a capital of \$10,000 is being organized at Chesaning for the purpose of establishing a canning factory there.

Arthur L. Parry has been committed to the Washtenaw county jail in default of \$5,000 bond on the charge that he abused his 15-year-old niece.

A government official who is in a position to know says that one drug-die in Van Buren county sells twenty-five barrels of whiskey every year.

Daniel Allen got a verdict of \$162.72 in the circuit court of Washtenaw county against a man named William Ransom, who called him names and said he was a perjurer.

THE BURDICK MURDER

Judge Murphy's Summing Up of the Evidence

Judge Murphy, in his findings in the Burdick murder, declares that the identity of the murderer has not been proved.

Special attention is given to the details exchanged between Arthur H. Burdick and Justice Murphy.

STATE LEGISLATURE

Brief Chronicle of Matters of Importance

The Kelly bill, exempting mortgages and land contracts from taxation—a reform which has been the subject of agitation for years—now before the house, having passed the senate.

A query has arisen among members of the legislature as to whether there is a row between Gov. Bliss and the members of the advisory board on pardons.

An important proposition, which is likely to be considered by the house committee on ways and means, is that there shall be attached to every appropriation bill for supplies at state institutions a proviso that such supplies if they be such things as clothes, food or furniture, shall be purchased from Michigan persons, firms or corporations.

There is a scheme behind the bill recently passed by the senate, permitting brewers to establish branch agencies upon payment of \$50, conditional upon their paying one brewer's license of \$500, at least, that is what an experienced man in liquor matters says.

Senator Baird has perfected his long threatened primary reform bill for the whole state.

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Killed His Brother.



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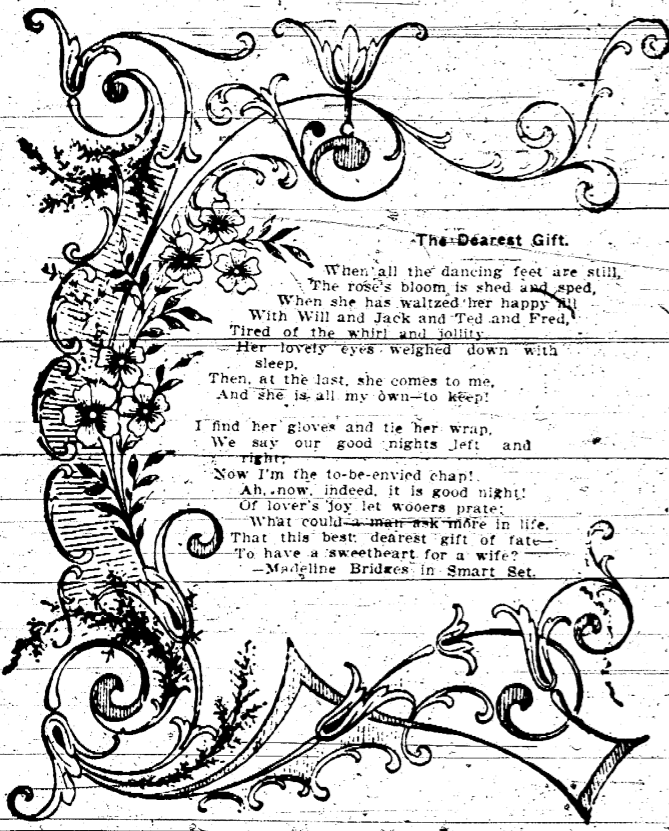

SPLITTING UP THE NICKEL.

Practice of New Orleans Stores and Markets With Small Purchasers. "You would be surprised to know the vast number of children among the poorer classes in New Orleans who do not clearly understand the value and function of the nickel," said a storekeeper downtown, "and it results from the popularity of the nickel system, which has always been so much a part of life in this city. They are the small buyers who run all kinds of errands for the little family to which they belong."

"Sometimes they will spend only a part of the nickel, and will get a ticket, or tickets, or maybe pennies, in change. Frequently the purchase will amount to 2 1/2 cents, and then they get a pasteboard check for the other 2 1/2 cents, which is legal tender at the place issuing it for its face value. Checks or tickets of this kind are extensively used in this city, and they have added greatly to the circulation of a sort of crude, subsidiary money."

One of those checks is as good as gold at the grocery or market stall where it is issued. It is predicated on and gets its value from a redemption fund, just like Uncle Sam's money, except that instead of being redeemable in gold on demand, it is exchangeable at the grocery at its face value for any of the things in stock, or good at the vegetable stall at the market place for 2 1/2 cents' worth of anything on hand when it is presented. It is always good for what it calls for on its face."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.
