Secret service agents kept close tabs on Machen, and know with whom he talked in Detroit, and this information may be put to use later on.

There is considerable speculation going on as to whether Machen will make a confession in the event of his being sent to prison. That he could tell a startling story is unquestioned, and officials say that one of the most interesting chapters would refer to his Michigan connections.

Washington News. The house passed the naval appropriation bill Friday after having had it under consideration for a week. The president has decided to appoint Roy M. Harrod, of New Orleans, a member of the isthmian canal commission.

Drubbed the Maros. Gen. Wade in a cablegram from Manila, advises the war department of a report of Gen. Wood concerning an engagement at Jolo, on the 14th inst. with the remnants of Hassan's Cotabato force. The American expedition was in charge of Maj. Hugh L. Scott. During the fight Gen. Wood was killed twice, was stopped to give the Maros a chance to surrender, but they declined. The entire body, he adds, with the exception of Hassan, is either dead or captured, and Hassan is located.

Predictions of disturbances at certain points caused some apprehension, but so far as reported nothing unusual occurred. While the liberal representation has been increased by several seats, the small republican party is in the senate will prevent any radical change of policy.

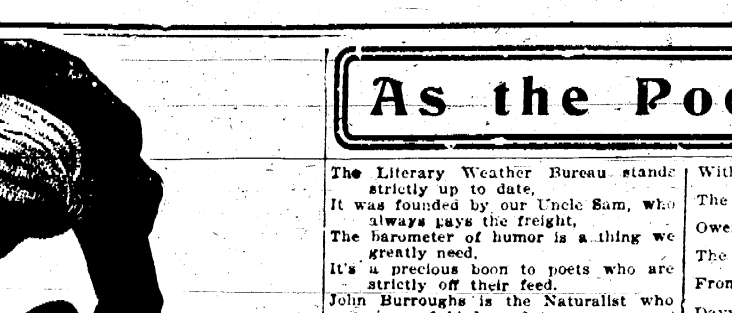

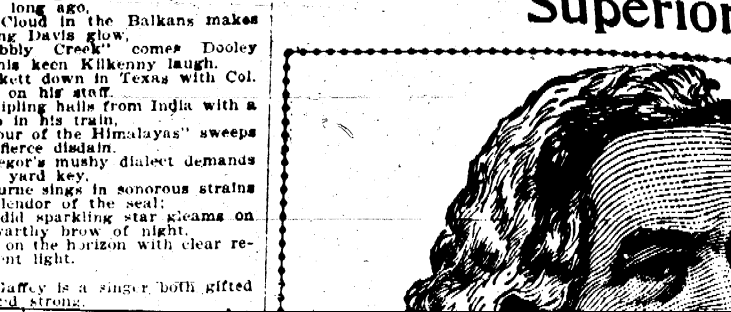
