OUR DUTY

The Township Trustees of Manchester are circulating a petition for the purpose of raising money to erect a monument to the memory of the soldiers of Manchester and vicinity who gave their lives for their country. C. are never engaged in any other, the ENTERPRISE believes that the money should be paid and the work done by the township.

It was the township that called the boys to take up arms and put down a rebellion. The township provided the money to take care of them, and they were widows and orphans, those who had died.

How well has the township kept its pledge? Some townships have erected fine monuments to the memory of the illustrious soldiers, but Manchester has done nothing. It is high time it should act. The money would come from the right source and not be paid by a select few who are patriotic and liberal enough to put their hands in their pockets and alone pay the debt the township owe.

We hope that our readers will urge the township board to take prompt action on this long delayed matter.

LESS PAY.

The board of county auditors at their last meeting passed resolutions regarding the charges of physicians in county cases and the source through which the physicians are to look for their pay in the future. Hereafter these bills have been passed upon by the auditors but the change makes it necessary for the locality in which the patient is treated to stand the expense. Following are the resolutions: Resolved, That all bills for discharging contagious disease cases be paid by the township or village or city where the cases are located and not by the county.

Resolved, That the county of Washington pay the following fees for attending contagious disease in indigent cases: For smallpox and diphtheria, \$5.00 per visit; for other contagious diseases, \$2.00 per visit, within the corporate limits of the township, village or city; and for every other case person attending at the same time in some house, attending physician to receive \$1.00 a visit for each and every such other sick person.
