Edward Morris of Chicago has beume the owner of the Harvard homestand at Stratford-on-Avon, England. the house built in 1596 by the grandfuther of John Harvard, who founded Marvard university. Marie Corelli, the English novelist, acted as Mr. Morris' agent, and the price paid is said to have been close to \$6,000.

H Mr. Morris accepts the suggestion of Miss Corelli, who urged him to purchase the property, he will convert it into a clubhouse for the accommodation and entertainment of the thousands of Americans who annually make a pilgrimage to the birthplace of Shakespeare.

The quaint old dwelling in High street, not far from the birthplace of the poet long has been one of the principal objects of interest at Stratford, and its purchase by Mr. Morris has attracted considerable attention in England.

It is the intention of Mr. Morris to restore the house to its original picsuresqueness. Some parts of it need repairs, though the facade, which is he more interesting portion, on ac count of the elaborate carving, is in a remarkably good state of preservation Mr. Morris says.

Bought in a Curious Way. Mr. Morris purchased the property in a curious way. He and Mrs. Morris and Miss Corelli and several others were the guests of Sir Thomas Lipton on a yachting cruise off the south of England, and it was then that Miss Corelli made the suggestion:

"It would be a fine thing if some rich American would establish a clubhouse at Stratford-on-Avon for his country-

The suggestion grew on the Chicago packer, and when he and Mrs. Morris visited the birthplace of Shakespeare. and he learned that Harvard was for sale, he asked Miss Corelli if could not make arrangements for him to become the purchaser.

Stratford is dear to the heart of the author, and her strong protests against a suggestion that once was made by Americans for the purchase of Shakespeare's home are remem bered, but Mr. Morris' proposition de lighted her. She not only consented ort as his agent but all the details of the purchase.

Lacks Modern Improvements. The house has no modern improvements, and probably it would be difficult to find a tenant for it if it were



We are now drawing near to the close of the seventy years (dating from the begin, ning of the captivities B. C. 606-4) for which period Jefemiah had foretold that the exile should continue (Jer. 25: 12).

We now come to the providential movements which made the Return possible. A new king, and a new policy, now took possession of the empire that held the Jews captive. Cyrus the Persian conquered Babylon.

Babylon the Great. From the time of Nebuchadnezzar's father (B. C. 625) Babylon rose in grandeur, power and extent, till it became, under Nebuchadnezzar, such a city as never was seen before, the most magnificent and beautiful city of antiquity.

Belshazzar. The nominal king of Babylon at this time was Nabonidus. He was a most scholarly man rather than ruler, interested in his country's institutions, and making most valuable ecords on clay cylinders. There is, says Mr. Pinches, "every probability that Beishazzar, the son of Nabonidus, was the real ruler." We have learned about Belshazzar from these tablets and inscriptions lately discovered in the ruins of Babylon.
