THE EQUALIZATION LAW NOT VALID, SAYS MR. BIRD.

THIS FACT WILL NOT HELP THE RAILROADS IN THEIR GREAT FIGHT.

BOME TROUBLES THE NEW TAX COMMISSION MUST WRES-TLE WITH.

The New Equalization Law.

The new law instituting a three-man tax commission on Nov. 1 next, with powers to equalize assessments between the general and corporate proj erties of the state, will not hold water, according to the opinion of Attorney

General Bird, who says:
"I don't believe the constitutional
amendment of 1900 gives the legislature power to confer equalizing powers on the state tax commission. on the state tax commission.

amendment to section 11, article 14.

says: 'The legislature shall provide
an uniform rule of taxation, for such an uniform rule of taxation, for such property as shall be assessed by a state board of assessors, and the rate of taxation on such property shall be the rate which the state board of assessors shall ascertain and determine is the average rate levied upon the property upon which ad valorem other property upon which ad valorem taxes are assessed, etc."

"Would the invalidating of the equalization clause invalidate the entire ad valorem law."
"I don't believe in this case it would, because I think the law, is so constructed that it will stand as a com-

plete unit without that clause."

The average rate on the railroads at present is, \$16.92 per \$1,000 of assessment of the proventies of the

ent. Should the new commission esleast \$300,000,000 of general property not on the rolls, and with a slight increase in the money to be raised by taxation, the average rate against the roads for the next levy will fall to about \$13.68, meaning a decrease in the revenue for the school fund of ap-proximately \$500,000.

It will thus be seen that the measure of the new commission's possible trouble is in the difference between the total valuation made by the local assessing officers, \$1.575.664,999 and the \$1.800,000,000 or \$1.906.000,000 es timated by the tax commission; and on the other hand, there is the assurance that the railroad corporation chronically feels its tax too high.

Last Thanksgiving day twenty-six lonesome traveling men were at a certain hotel in Pittsburg, Pa. They had a dinner together and formed a society, to which they gave the above unique rame. They said that twenty-six cents should be the entrance fee, and quarterly dues, good fellowship with temperance and with economy, and promotion of the drummers' comfort should be the aim.

The clerk of the hotel consented to act as secretary, but soon his duties were so enlarged as to make necessary the establishment of a salaried office, and now S. N. Williams is secretary of the association, with more

Homeless 26," an Organization, than 5,000 members traveling men and hotel men at whose house no liquor is sold. In fact, every applicant for membership must be rec ommended by a member in good standing, and should the joiner prove unworthy, the sporsor is henceforth

without the pale. Every "Homeless 26" man feels in duty bound to sid his brother. If that frater is sick -a physician must be called and the association pays the bill. If he is without a position, 5,000 of the family are looking for a job for him, and at his death \$2,500 are given to his relatives. One member has died since the association was formed, his death occurring in an explosion of an oil tank, which wrecked a train near Pittsburg a few months ago Then an assessment of twenty-six cents brought \$1,300.

Another direction which the society has turned is the erection of a hotel, and they are carefully considering the erection of a \$50,000 building, where the man without a place to call home can go and be cared for until work is found. One of the social features is that whenever any of the members are together they have a little dinner.
The further development of this young but virile association will no doubt bring forth a social and insuring element of considerable power.
