Winter Windows Afloat

Among the most easily grown and satisfactory house plants for winter windows are the various kinds of ferns, especially suitable for city flats, where a window garden thrives with most difficulty. Hyacinths are not so desirable because they demand only a very simple culture. A four-inch pot serves for one large bulb, a five-inch pot for two and a six-inch pot for three. Roman hyacinths are extremely popular in price and are well brought to flower on Christmas. If potted in October, a succession, planned from time on, produces a succession of flowers throughout the winter. Three or four bulbs may be planted in a tinck pot or cover with ferns in a bulb pan or basket. Any good garden soil, mixed with one-fourth of coarse sand, will grow any sort of hyacinths. Use no manure, as it rots the bulb. Put an inch of broken charcoal, pottery or pebbles in the bottom of the pot for drainage.


