PER \$1,000.

The Law Is Void

The Galbraith equalization law is un-constitutional. What the last legisla-ture sought to do in the passage of the Calbraith law was held void by the suprome court in an opinion rendered shortly before noon Monday. The court grants the writ of mandamus applied for by Attorney-General Bird, to com-pel the state board of assessors to reconvene and fix a rate for the taxasion of railroads that share or deter-ment by using the assessed value of the general property of the state as the devisor of the total amount of tamos paid. This rate is \$17.40 per \$1,000, instead of \$14.51, which the asessors found by adding \$390,000,000 to the assessed value of the state on the theory that general property was not assessed at cash value.

Justice Montgomery wrote the opin-ion, which is concurred in by other jusices who sat-McAlvay, Grant, Or-

Trander and Hooker.

The opinion quotes the contention of Autorney-General Bird that Section 11 of Article 14 of the constitution provides the manner of ascertaining the rate and that the act known as the deliberth appropriation has was in con-Calbraith equalization law was in conflict therewith. The railroad compa-nies contended that the constitution does not forbid the legislature from providing for ascertainment of a true basis of taxation.

The court drew a distinction be-

tween that contention and the position of the board of assessors, which was that the constitutional provision itself conferred upon the board the power to determine according to its best judg-ment what the average rate levied on other property of the state may be

"It is not to be denied that the his-tory of the state has shown in the past many attempts to evade the constimany attempts to evade the constiinitional provision for the taxation of
property at its full cish value, reads
the opinion. "Nor is it intended to imply that if the corrective was intended
to be conferred by this constitutional
provision upon said board that they
have acted unreasonably or improperly. Indeed it may be said that with the
statute before them, prima facie, valid,
it called for their action along lines
they followed and for their ascertain. they followed and for their ascertain ment according to their best judgment of the real assessable value of the

But the court says the question of the policy of the constitutional provi-sion is not the controlling question, but

the provision kaelf, which it quotes.

"There is little room for construction," continues the court. "The important words are the rate of taxation upon such property shall be the rate which the state board of assessors shall secortain and determine is the shall ascertain and determine is the average rate levied upon other proper-ty upon which ad valorem taxes are assessed for state, county, township, school and municipal purposes."

"It is very clear that this excludes

all idea that provision might be made for ascertaining an average rate by taking an account of property upon which no taxes are assessed. To do so would be to do violence to the lan-

guage employed."

The opinion says further that the question is not an intricate or difficult one, "The language employed in this amendment is plain, clear English, ir requires no interpretation.

Gov. Gooding, of Idaho, has issued the following statement with respect to the assassination of former Gov. Frank Steunenberg, as is claimed, un-der the plans and by officers of the miners' union.

"I want to state officially that Harry Orchard has made a full confession as to the manner and motive of the assassination of former Gov. Steunenberg, relling of the plans made and giving the names of those making them. The assassination of former Gov. 

Primary Reform.

In preparing for the adoption of this method the following three steps are all of the points that are necessary for the voter to keep in mind:

First. Every friend of primary reform must go to his regular voting place on the first Monday in April, 1906, and have his name enrolled in the enrollment book of the party to which he belongs. A voter who fails to be enrolled cannot participate in the making of the proposed reform or in the selection of candidates for the ensuing two years.

Second, Every, enrolled voter then goes to his regular voting place on the and Tuesday of June, 1906, to vote for candidates for governor and lieutenant governor; and if 20 per cent of the qualified voters have previously petitioned the secretary of state to an election on the question, then they shall also vote whether or not the proposed primary law shall be adopted for the nomination of their congressional, legislative and

If a majority of the enrolled voters vote "yes," then, and not otherwise, shall the provisions of the proposed law apply to these nominations.

Third. It a majority of the enrolled voters vote in favor of nominating by the primary, or direct system, as outlined above, then every enrolled voter goes to his regular yoting place on the first Tuesday in September, 1906, and votes for the names he desires printed on his ticket for the office of congressman and for legislative and county offices. The candidates getting the largest number of votes on that day will be declared the nominees of their respective parties, and will be voted for at the regular election to be held in November, 1906.

Failure to participate in the nomina nations according to the foregoing outline will not hinder a qualified voter from yoting at the regular Novembe

Failure to adopt the proposed primary law will mean that the present method shall continue.

one year later, in the summer of 1789. he finished the organ. After due consideration it was pronounced a success, and was accepted and paid for by Capt. Smith, who at once presents it to the citizens of Winchester.

It was first used by the Congregational society, the only denomination in town holding service at that time. For about sixty years it was in constant use by either the Congressionalists or the Universalists.

The organ has five stops, namely, principal, stop diapason, open diapa-son, 12th and 15th. The 12th and 15th have metal pipes-made from the lead taken from tea chests.
