## Celebrations of Easter

**E**ASTER as a term to denote the "awakening" or rising of nature in the spring, is odd as it may appear, older than the Christian religion. Early explorers discovered that the Alaskan Indians celebrated their Easter in their own way, though, of course, without the religious significance that attaches to ours as a Christian festival. The Zulus have an Easter, and since the memory of man runneth not to the contrary, the Hopi Indians of the Southwest have celebrated the "awakening" of nature in the spring. Indeed, the general celebration of an Easter is as noticeable in one's studies of primitive people, as in the use of the cross among them, and we find that with every people the cross has a significance which is more often religious than otherwise. Among the Indians of the Southwest, for instance, the cross signifies the four directions of the compass, and as their religion is composed of a worship of the elements necessary to the growing of their corn, the cross idea has a place in it.

The Christian Easter, however, as it is celebrated among us to-day may be traced back to the early days of the Christian era. Although there is no data now in existence, the early disciples doubtless observed the anniversary of the resurrection in a way fitting to themselves and the times in which they lived. In any event, on the principle that all ceremonies have their foundation in a mere custom, it was early in the Christian era that Easter became an established holy day in the church, and now in all lands where a knowledge of the life and works of Christ has penetrated it is observed as a day of especial sacredness.

**E**xactly as it does, an event—the event, indeed—upon which the Christian, or rather, orthodox Christian religion has been "built," is none the less a movable holy day. Concerning this peculiarity of the festival, there has ever been a great diversity of opinion among churchmen. From the earliest times disputes were held over the proper date of Easter. In some localities the actual anniversary of the date was feasted upon, while in other localities the date was determined according to the prescription of the Mosala Law. A general Council at Nicea, however, held in 325, ended both this diversity and all controversies arising therefrom by giving authoritative directions to the following effect:

**H**old five pounds of expensive bonbons. My lady fair may well appreciate such gorgeous Easter gifts as these—satisfying to the inner woman as well as gratifying to the eye. But there are many things in the same line that are pleasing without being costly—such, for example, as a comic rabbit eating a carrot. When a small rabbit is turned with the fingers the rabbit swallows the carrot again and again. Of course, it is a candy-box.

**H**omely Dumpty appears in a new guise this Easter—a huge egg painted with a sunny face, with white collar and necktie, the legs and arms being of wire. He leans upon a staff, Gobbins appropriate at home, with the aid of a little ingenuity, a few bits of wire, some scraps of cloth, and blown eggs painted with comic faces. These home made gnomes can be made to represent various characters, such as Father Knickerbocker, with cocked hat and black velvet breeches edged with lace—or a policeman, or a prize fighter, or what you please. **I**n Easter guise, dressed in a fantastic costume of paper, wearing an Easter hat, and carrying a parasol. On the candy box upon which she stands is the inscription, "Easter Parade." If there is an object intimately associated with Easter nowadays—as a new—perhaps as the rabbit or the newly hatched chick—it is the Easter hat. It is used to be an Easter bonnet, but nobody wears bonnets nowadays at Easter or any other time, unless one has given up the vanities of this world to a large extent, and more particularly the personal ones. Accordingly, the Easter hat appears appropriately in the middle of the table at Easter lunch parties, made of straw and filled with flowers, or made of candy and filled with candy eggs, or candy chicks, or candy flowers. Or the hat may be filled with apricot sugar, with a hen sitting in the middle of it on a "setting" of candy eggs.

### WAR MADE CHANGE IN STYLE.

Japanese Women No Longer Elaborately Dress Hair.

"Of all her earthly possessions, a Japanese woman most values her hair," writes Mrs. Hugh Fraser. "Her crown, her veil, the mark of her womanhood, that which tells her and others what she is. The country title for the housemistress is 'O'kami San,' 'she of the honorable hair,' and next to the binding of the obi, which is the mark of modesty, nothing is of such importance as the care of the hair, few sacrifices so great as the relinquishment of the proper dressing thereof."

"As for dressing her hair herself no Japanese woman can do that, and all, except the most miserably poor, have been in the habit of paying 30 sen (15 cents) a month to the hair-dresser to take care of it for them. Since the beginning of the Russian war this sum has been almost universally laid aside to hand over to the war fund, and, coming regularly from millions of women, has amounted to a very respectable whole."

"The result has been a curious change in the appearance of these sturdy little patriots. When I was in Japan before I hardly ever saw a woman with her hair down; now there are hundreds in the streets, their silky locks being merely turned back from the forehead with a comb, and hanging down in a beautiful mantle far below their waists."

### HAS A FOX FARM.

#### MISSIONARY RAISES ANIMALS FOR THEIR PELTS.

Experiment Pronounced Successful, and Others Are Engaging in the Business—Instance of Cannibalism Noticed by Dr. Grenfell.

P. T. McGrath writes to The Daily News from St. Johns, N. F.: "One of the pet theories of the authors of animal stories, that creatures of a given species display marked affection for each other, has received a rude shock from the experience of Dr. Grenfell, the well-known Labrador missionary, who has added to his multitudinous activities by establishing a fox farm at the mission hospital in the far north of this island, where he is wintering. On Christmas day Dr. Grenfell had given orders to the keeper of the little farm to provide the foxes with a substantial Christmas dinner. But despite the fact that they had never been allowed to lack for whale meat, they made for themselves a special feast. They killed and devoured, all but the feet and tail, of one of their own number. In the pen where this foul deed was perpetrated there were four young foxes and the one killed was a brother of the fat fellow who ate most of him. The disillusionment, therefore, is complete."

The industrial aspect of the matter, however, is more encouraging. Fox farming, as a business, is now being taken hold of in several parts of maritime Canada and Newfoundland and excellent results are appearing to those engaged in the venture. It requires careful preparation, though, else a whole flock of "foxes" may be lost. They resent their confinement and will burrow down deep into the earth to get under the fences which inclose them, when they will all escape. So it has become necessary to dig a trench round their pens and to erect a fence of wire netting therein, carrying this up to the height of a man's chest above ground, this plan preventing their escape in any manner. Dr. Grenfell's great hope is to be able to breed the silver gray, or arctic foxes, the pelts of which sell at from \$20 to \$200 each. This is a comparatively unknown venture, the breeding of the common red fox being the general practice. Arctic foxes are difficult to get, save in a habitat like northern Newfoundland or Labrador, where also it is possible to reproduce the fur of a strength and beauty not attainable in more southern areas.

"Domestication of foxes involves careful attention to details of food, exercise and surroundings, but in the event of success handsome results are often realized. The foxes at first are sullen, morose or vicious, constantly quarreling or passionately beating themselves against their prison walls, frequently dying of the fever induced by these paroxysms. In time, though, by kind treatment, they become more reasonable in their moods, and ultimately they will mate and breed as under natural conditions. The skin of the offspring sometimes develops odd markings or parti-colors, a throwing back or reversion to original conditions which are interesting to scientists, but unprofitable to the farmer. Red-fox skins bring \$20 to \$25 each in prime condition, and arctic fox skins are the only item of outlay; it is easy to make the business profitable. The experiment of domesticating and breeding silver foxes promises vastly more money than the other."

### A Cat Story.

This is a true cat-story. A certain cat, much petted and adored, is believed to understand language, it having repeatedly acted upon what was said to it, but not long since it did far more, and better. It obeyed literally. The man of the house is a great hunter. Nothing will convince the friends of this wonderful cat that he doesn't understand all that is said in his presence, and they are so well fitted to mention a want, as the dear fellow will think he must immediately gratify it, like another Miksalis of Carabas.—Boston Herald.

### HORSE MEAT.

Germany Now Eating Large Quantities of This Kind of Food.

The Consul-General of the United States at Berlin, Germany, is evidently getting used to foreign habits, for he says: "Apart from the very general sentiment of respect for the horse as an animal too noble and useful for the degradation of the slaughter-house, there is perhaps no good reason why its flesh is not as clean and nutritious as that of hotted cattle, and the fact of its far greater cheapness in a country where all meat is so costly as it now is in Germany, makes the well-regulated system of horse-meat preparation and supply in Berlin a real boon to a large class of people."

Thus we learn that the choicest cuts of this class of food sell in Berlin at from eight to ten cents per pound. Meat from the rear quarters of from any part of poor, old or inferior horses sells as low as three or four cents. The liver is considered a delicate morsel and brings ten cents per pound.

The inferior pieces go into the mill for the manufacture of those strongly flavored garlicky sausages that are the favorite food of many people in Germany. In the better grades of these sausages, pork is mixed to give the requisite fatness. When sold for food in Berlin they must be plainly labeled horseflesh.

"But outside the municipality this regulation is not enforced, so that quantities of sausages made of horseflesh, with only a small percentage of pork, veal or other than meat from the horse in their composition, are sold to the country districts or exported to neighboring countries as ordinary pork sausages."
