Sold into bondage by her father, Malica Adams, aged 15, after four years, has been restored to her uncle in Grand Rapids. Joseph Adams sold his daughter to the leader of a band of gypsies, and she became the bride of his 13-year-old son three years ago.
The child wife became a palmist, but finally tired of the gypsy customs. 




