About \$80 was found on his person. It is said that he had nearly the whole of his \$1,700 in his house just before his death. The money was from a business deal which he settled up in Cnicago last Memorial day and he had repeatedly shown it to people.

Died from Stroke of Apoplexy in Milwaukee Sunday.

Ex-Governor Aaron T. Bliss died at Sacred Heart Sanitarium at Milwaukee at 4 o'clock Sunday morning, of a stroke of apoplexy. The death was sudden, but not entirely unexpected, because his condi-

tion was such that a stroke was momentarily looked for. A few moments before he died he awoke and aroused his nurse, who took him his bathrobe. Mr. Bliss was returning to his bed with the aid of his nurse and was only a few feet from the bed when he was stricken and plunged to the floor.

Dr. E. S. Davis, his private physician, who has been in constant attendance, was asleep in the next room. He was aroused by the nurse and hurried to his patient's assistance, but found him dead.
