



When a child has learned to master the stumbling and barrier-like words of aurora borealis and asafoetida it has begun to get a grasp on its dominant brain and the child brain that works over the victory of putting the proper amount of a's in Mississippi has made a stand on an upper plane and will in itself strive for other victims in other directions.

So far as the spelling itself is concerned, we might just as well spell asafoetida asafitida, or aurora borealis arora borvailis, but then when it comes to the phonetic system, who's going to stop us from going as far as we like, and where are we going to have any reward for being right? As a socialistic proposition it is a sublime victory for free thinkers, for it makes us all equal in that respect at least.
