LETTER TO ROOT GIVING CABINET FACTS SUPPRESSED BY EX--AMRASSADOR

His Conduct is Called Peculiarly Ungentlemanly and His Statement About a Message to the Pope Branded as Untrue.

Washington, Dec. 10. - President Roosevelt Sunday night made public long letter addressed to Secretary Root giving correspondence between the president and former Ambassador Bellamy Storer, at Vienna, and Mrs. Storer, in which he says that Mr. Storer's refusal to answer his letters and the publication of various private letters justified the ambassador's removal; that Mr. Storer's publication of private correspondence was peculiarly ungentlemanly and that he (the president) had stated with absolute clearness his position the reason why it was out of the question for him as president to try to get any archbishop made cardinal, though expressing his admiration for Archbishop Ireland as well as leaders of other denomina-

He says he thinks it well that the members of the cabinet should know en, from 1855 until 1861. He was certain facts "which he (Storer) rector at St. Mary's church, Manhad either suppresses or misstates." He says he did not resent the action of the Storers "until it became evident they were likely to camage American interests." He says Mrs. Storer urged him to give her husband a cabinet place and that she stated Mr. Choate at London and Gen. TONNAGE NOW GREATEST IN OUR HISTORY, SAYS SEC-RETARY METCALF.

Head of Commerce and Labor Depart ment Urges Passage of Ship Subsidy Bill so Country Can Regain Foreign Carrying Trade. .

Washington, Dec. 8.-According to the annual report of Secretary Commerce and Labor Metcalf the total documental merchant shipping of the United States June 30, 1906, comprised 25,006 vessels, of 6,674,969 comprised 20,000 vessels, of 0,01,300 gross tons; the largest tonnage in the nation's history. More than that, he jured, and of these C. J. Pope, of nation's history. More than that, he says that unless unforeseen obstacles arise the output of vessels for the year ending June 30, 1907, will probably exceed the output of any year burned, and Friday night his during the past half century.

Mr. Metcalf says in this connec tion:

"The encouraging forecast for shipbuilding in my last report has been made good by the construction of ves-sels aggregating 418,745 gross tons. One hundred steel steamers, of 289,-094 gross tons, were built, and this output is due almost wholly to the ac-tivity of the ahipyards of the great lakes, where for the first time steamers of over 7,000 gross tons have been constructed. CORNELL IS IN MOURNING

FOUR STUDENTS AND THREE TOWNSMEN PERISHED IN FIRE.

Great Herolem Displayed by the Boys in Rescuing Mates from Blazing Chi Psi House.

Ithaca, N. Y., Dec. 8 .-- All Friday smoke drifted across Cornell campus from the ruins of the Chi Psi fraternity house, the burning of which at an early hour was attended with a loss of life that has thrown not only the university but the whole city into mourning. Friday night the dead numbered seven. Of these, four werg students, and the others prominent townsmen who had responded to the firev en.

Among the students who escaped East Orrage, N. J., it is feared will not long survive. He was removed to burned, and Friday night his condi-tion had not perceptibly improved.

The bodies of the dead, with the exception of those of W. H. Nichols, of-Chicago, and F. W. Grene, of East Orange, N. J., were recovered. Friday night it was decided to dynamite the ruins to facilitate the search for the missing bodies.
