Lansing—Under the recent decision of the supreme court in the Manly case the attorney general holds that eventually all convicts in force in the prisons of the state except one may not be received and cannot be carried out except in a limited way. The attorney general informed Warden Russell, of the Marquette prison, that under the decision of the court clogging is a mechanical trade, and that he must put no more men at work making cigars unless they are learned in the business of clogging before coming to the prison.
