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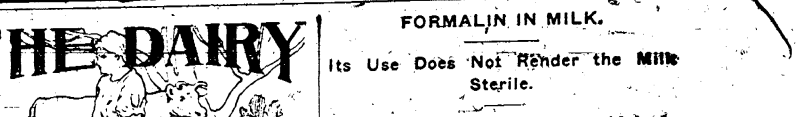

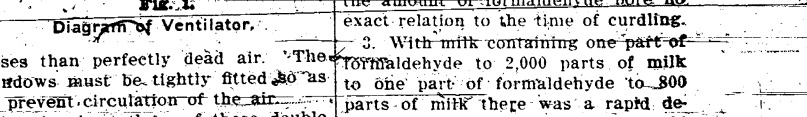
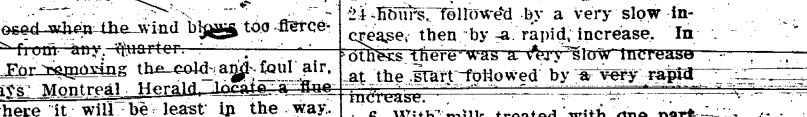


Diagram of Ventilator.

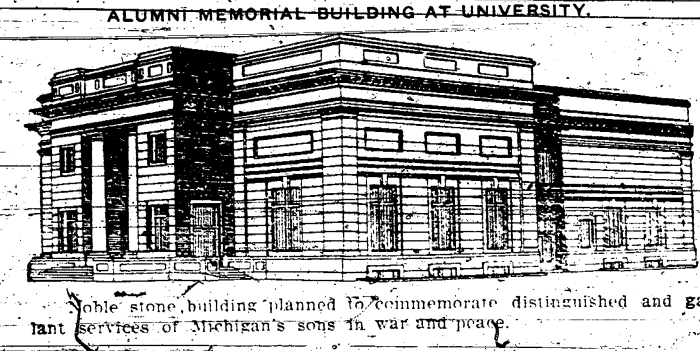

candidate for United States senator, called on Attorney General Bird to make a thorough investigation of the rumors that improper methods had been employed to promote his candidacy. The rumors, on account of which Governor Warner has announced himself opposed to Hill's election, again were declared baseless by the candidate, who says they involve the integrity of the legislature.

Attorney General Bird addressed a letter to Arthur Hill at Saginaw stating that he is unable to make the investigation which Mr. Hill requested, of the charges made by Gov. Fred M. Warner, that he had used improper methods in his campaign for United States senator. Mr. Bird charges, he says in the letter, that the charges are unfounded and that the public should be informed whether they are true or false, but he questions his authority to investigate in the absence of any definite information as to the basis thereof. He says he has no authority as state officer, member of the legislature or in any other official position to do any tangible proof of corrupt methods in advancing the interests of any candidate for United States senator. I will use my authority to the fullest extent to investigate the matter and lay the result before the legislature.

After receiving Attorney General Bird's letter, Arthur Hill of this city said: "Light now begins to appear above the horizon. Now," he continued, after showing the letter, "there is an opportunity for any man in the state from governor down to file his charges as to improper methods employed by any candidate for the United States senatorship. The attorney

General is ready and will proceed promptly with the investigation.

Gov. Fred M. Warner sent out from his sick room, when asked for some expression on the many rumors as to his position in the senatorial race, the following statement: "All reports that have been published circulated that I am now publishing this candidate or that I am a candidate for senator are false as are many other statements regarding me or what I have said that have been given out since last Wednesday when I gave out the Hill-Atwood charges. I believed them and I believe now that I was justified in making the statement I did at that time. Any insinuations that my action was influenced in any way by my desire to be senator this year or any other year, are as false as they are unjust. I am not and shall not be a candidate."

Must Grant Change of Venue.

The supreme court granted a mandamus to compel Judge Brooks of the Wayne circuit court to grant a change of venue in the case of the Detroit National bank against the Union Trust company, receiver. This is one of the Frank C. Anderson certified check cases, which was at issue in the supreme court when the new rule providing for change of venue went into effect. The rule provides that an application for change of venue must be made within ten days after the cause is at issue, but in this case the change being before the supreme court, the application was not made until after the case had been decided and sent back for a new trial. The supreme court holds that the rule does not apply to such circumstances, as it would have been an idle ceremony to apply for a change of venue when there was no certainty that the case would be sent back for a new trial.

BOWLING IS STRENUOUS WORK.

In Fifty Games a Man Lifts a Total of Six Tons.

Bowling is declared to be a more strenuous physical strain to bowlers than to play the game of football. It does not seem as hard, of course, to shoot balls down an alley, as to tackle 200 pounds of live beef, but it is the game that makes the work easier and the results far more satisfactory.

The fifty games to be rolled is equal to 500 frames or innings for each bowler, in this number of frames, not figuring the added balls for strikes in every tenth, there would probably be an average of 160 strikes. For strikes the bowling ball is handled once and for the 300 spares twice, a total of 840 times that the ball is sent down the alley.

A regulation bowling ball weighs 16 pounds. When banded 840 times, the total weight is 13,440 pounds, or more than six tons.

The time in which the 50 game match is to be played is variously estimated at from six to eight hours.

Figured at seven hours, which is about the maximum and conservative estimate, it will be seen that the bowlers handle the weight of nearly seven tons at the rate of a ton an hour, or more than 90 pounds every minute.

The runway over which the bowler moves to the foul line is nearly 20 feet in length, and the 840 times in which each delivery of the ball makes a total of nearly 1,700 feet. To this must be added the further distance to the ball rack, 15 feet, so that the bowler, and possibly to the mahogany floor, bowlers have been known to crook an elbow for other things than delivering a ball, adding enough in distance to make a grand total of more than five miles of pedestrian work in the seven hours on the alley.

GIRL'S FIVE-MILE RIDE WITH DEATH.

CLINGS DESPERATELY TO SIDE OF FAST-FLYING TRAIN. COLLAPSES WHEN SAVED

Young Woman Mounts Step of Moving Car but Vestibule Door Refuses to Open—Operator Orders Limited Stopped.

Logansport, Ind.—Her dresses the playing of the winds, her hair blowing in wild disorder, Miss Edith Milliron, one of Logansport's prettiest and best known young women, desperately clung to the handles of a closed vestibule car the other week for five miles while the Continental limited, the Wabash's fastest train, tore through space at the rate of 50 miles an hour. 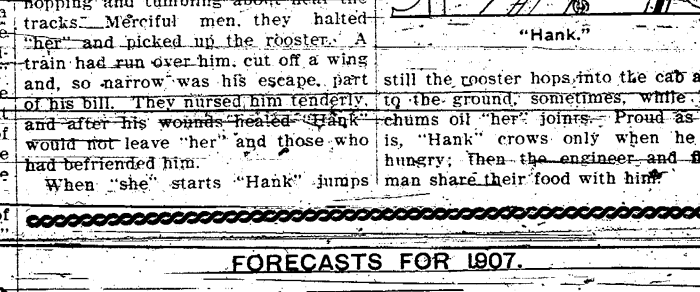

TEA KILLS TYPHOID GERM.

Discovery Announced by British Army Surgeon.

Tea is a preventive of typhoid. It has just been announced in England. The discovery is made by Maj. J. G. McNaught, a surgeon in the British Army, who acquaints the medical profession in America with the particulars of his experiments.

He finds that the typhoid germ, in pure culture, becomes greatly diminished in numbers by an exposure of four hours to the beverage. After 20 hours it was impossible to recover the germs at all from the cold tea. He recommends the use of cold tea as a substitute for water in soldiers' canteens during active service. Even when the water is sufficiently sterilized it is likely to become affected after once being filled with contaminated water and capable of transmitting the infection for a long time.

Maj. McNaught suggests that every body drink tea, if prepared in a proper manner, tea, according to physicians, constitutes a refreshing and not harmful beverage; for it is the tannin and other extractives, which are drawn out only after continued steeping, which are productive of harmful consequences. "Boiled" tea gives a copious coat to the stomach and a saffron hue to the face.

If employed in the manner indicated in localities where typhoid is known to be present tea may thus serve as one of the essential precautionary measures to guard against infection by this dread disease.
