What Is Going On at the National Capital.

The Nation's bread is justly entitled to be called the "state of life" as it is fully borne out by investigations of the United States department of commerce and labor. This department made an investigation to determine the amount spent for food by a "normal" laboring family. The results of this investigation are published in a report which shows that the average amount spent for food by a family consisting of husband, wife and three children is \$229.10 per year. It is interesting to note how the so-called normal family of the average laborer which seems rather to be the normal in size, spends its money for food and other necessities. The investigation shows that 20 cents is expended for bread, flour and cereals, and the rest of the food is spent on meat, butter, eggs, and other necessities. The investigation also shows that the average laborer spends \$10.00 per year for all kinds of meat, three and a half times as much for bread. His bread costs him about 10 cents a loaf, which is about 10 cents more than the average laborer spends for potatoes and vegetables as for bread. Thirty-eight cents is used for meat, and 40 cents for sugar, while only 10 cents is spent for the one and five dollars for the other. Religion, charity and tobacco are the largest items in the miscellaneous category. Labor organizations got about nine dollars per year, while the miscellaneous category got about 10 cents.

From the State Capital

Information and Gossip Furnished by Special Correspondent at Lansing.

Lansing—Michigan roads are said to be obeying the nine-hour transportation law, which has gone into effect. "We have met the situation," said R. J. L'Honmelle, general manager of the Michigan Central, "and the other railroads abandoned." "None where we have an agent and are doing business. There are a few places where night operators were used for the handling of trains, that are closed, and one or two on the Michigan Central, but the rest are closed."

Detroit Free Wrangle Is On. The public utility board's restriction on its enforcement followed the adoption by the Detroit common council of the city street railway ordinance and the subsequent signing by the mayor of the ordinance. "The ordinance provides for three-cent fares on all lines upon which the franchise has expired and universal transfers from those lines to all other lines operated by the company. According to officials this at present involves about five miles out of an approximate total of 150 miles, while the franchise on 54 additional miles expires November 1, 1919. United States District Judge Swan previously dissolved an injunction restraining the council from enforcing the ordinance. The board still retained a federal court injunction restraining the Detroit Traction Railway from operating under the terms of the ordinance. Both injunctions were obtained by the Guaranty Trust company of New York, which represents the bondholders. Some observers of the situation went so far as to predict that the Detroit traction board will be dissolved in the near future. There are some important points on the system which have been taken over and transferred to busier parts. We shall not have to employ a great many more men.

Many Petitions Tended. Extra clerks were employed by the secretary of state and a part of the signatures on the petitions received for the submission of the direct appropriation law in large number of senatorial districts. Besides the postal card petitions from districts, articles of constitutional amendment were submitted at the April election in at least nine senatorial districts, outside of Detroit and Kent counties where the law was expected to apply. This number did not include districts where the result was doubtful, but in several districts where the law was already in effect. In all probability, the governor believes, direct appropriation law will be submitted to some of the state legislatures. Gov.
