Paris—The Allies are fighting their way forward, and the armies of Gen. Sir Douglas Haig and Gen. Sir Herbert Plumer are in full retreat in the direction of Peronne, Neale and Ham. Important rear guards are being sacrificed by the enemy in order to delay the advance.
