Of Youths of 16 and 17. East Lansing, Oct. 5.—The res-ponsibility for keeping up production of food to the level of American and allied demands rests on the boys of 15 to 17 years of age, asserts Ashley M. Berridge, director of short courses at the Michigan Agricultural College. Next year the help of boys from 18 to 21 and men from 31 to 45 will not be available. It will be up to the younger boys to step into the breach on the farms of the state. As a measure towards assisting these young men to render efficient service in this direction, M. A. C. has prepared a series of short courses of two, four, eight and 16 weeks in length. It is expected to intensively train boys who present themselves The courses will be open to boys and young men without charge, except a small entrance fee. They will be conducted as other courses at the college with the difference, however, that these young men will be trained with a view to fitting them imme-diately for the tasks in hand. It is suggested that boys—and women also, if they are interested— get in touch with their courses, Mich-igan Agricultural College, East Lan-sing.
