

Divestiture Legislation Approved

Legislation that would require various state pension plans to withdraw their assets from firms owned or operated in South Africa was approved today by the Michigan House and an area lawmaker said the vote was "a premature decision that could be

State Representative Margaret O'Connor (R-Saline) said that while she is strongly opposed to apartheid and all forms of racial oppression, the legislation may not be the proper avenue to address the issue.

"The divestiture legislation is well intentioned, but I worry about the effect it will have on retirees in this state. The economic consequences of today's action could eventually cost state taxpayers," O'Connor said.

"I also think much more research should have been done on the issue before we made this move. Lawmakers should have waited until the administration's special commission on divestiture released more information."


On a 67-39 vote, lawmakers approved what calls for a phased withdrawal of assets of the State Employees and Public School Employees Retirement Funds from all investments held in firms owned by the South African government or from American firms which operate there. The legislation would require that total divestiture be achieved within five years.


O'Connor said that it is difficult to predict how this phased divestiture will ultimately affect

the investment performance of the retirement funds. But some officials predict that there will be loss of investment income to retirement funds and however nominal the losses are, the state will have to make up the revenue.

"The general fund money used to make up the difference comes from the taxpayers of Michigan. who will have to foot the bill for this decision," O'Connor said.

"I also have problems with state legislators making a foreign policy decision. This should be a matter for our federal lawmakers to consider and I think we're out of our jurisdiction," she said.
