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## Lynda Kosinski Century III Scholarship Finalist



The Century III Leadership Scholarship Competition has announced that Lynda Kosinski, a senior at Manchester High School, has been selected as one of ten state finalists in Michigan. Students are judged on the basis of leadership abilities, a current events exam, school and community involvement, and an essay written on an issue facing America. Lynda competed with 117 students across Michigan. The program is administered by the National Association of Secondary School Principals and funded by the Shell Companies Foundation, Inc.

The ten finalists all had individual interviews with the state selection committee. In mid-January the two state winners will be announced. They will receive \$1500.00 scholarships to the college of their choice and an all-expense paid trip to the National Century III Leaders Conference in Williamsburg, Virginia, in March. There the two Michigan winners will meet with other state winners to discuss issues facing America in its third

century. Two state alternates will receive \$500.00 scholarships and the other six finalists will receive \$100.00 scholarships.

At the state level the written essay was the most important element of the competition. Applicants were to choose an issue that they feel America will face in its third century. They were to explain the importance of the issue, propose a possible solution to the issue, and consider what they as a leader could do to achieve that solution. Lynda's topic addressed the predicted teacher shortage that will be facing our country soon. Her solution to the problem was a series of national tax credits to encourage more students to enroll in teacher training programs.

Lynda is the only student from Washtenaw County to have advanced to finalist status this year and is the first Manchester student ever to become a finalist in this competition. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Dawdy of 10656 Clinton Road. Lynda plans to attend Michigan State University next year and major in business administration with a pre-law emphasis.

## Mr. Baldwin Fought Indians

Many of our home readers will remember M.J. Baldwin a printer who worked in the Enterprise office some 20 years ago. We received a letter from him lately from which we excerpt the following:

"I have had a varied experience since leaving Manchester. After leaving, that is about three years after I think, I enlisted in the regular army and served ten years in the infantry, all of the service being in the west excepting two years and a half at Ft. Wayne near Detroit. I got mixed up in one Indian campaign in the winter of 1890-91 in South Dakota. That was no 4th of July celebration, I tell you, with the thermometer down around 35 to 40 degrees below zero. The Sioux went on the war path in November in 1890. We went into the field in November and did not get back till the following spring, in May. About 7,000 or 8,000 warriors went on the war path in North and South Dakota and the troops had a strenuous time rounding them up. At the battle of Wounded Knee in South Dakota the troops wiped out Big Foot's band. This was the only real engagement, the rest of the campaign was mostly skirmishes. After the battle at Wounded Knee, the troops dug a trench about 100 feet long by 30 feet wide and piled Big Foot and his band into the trench like cord wood and covered them up. In this campaign Sitting Bull was killed at or near Standing Rock in North Dakota by the Indian police. Gen. Miles sent the Indian police after him with orders to bring Sitting Bull to him dead or alive. I was all over the middle west from the Mississippi River to the Rocky mountains and had a varied experience during the time. During the time I was west I was with the sixth U.S. Cavalry as post printer for two years. That was a fat job. My term of enlistment was up while with these troops and the sergeant major of the regiment tried to induce me to enlist in his regiment but I did not.

"After leaving the army I went to Brooklyn navy yard at Brooklyn, N.Y., to enter the navy but I changed my mind and have been in civil life since."

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## Combat The Drunk Driving Problem

Michigan citizens are urged to help the State Police combat the drunk driving problem by calling 1-800-525-5555, a special toll-free hotline introduced today, to report suspected drunk drivers, according to Col. Gerald L. Hough, department director.

"Drunk driving isn't just a police problem - it's everyone's. So far this year, 1414 people have lost their lives on the state's highways - fifty percent of these

fatalities involved the use of alcohol," Hough pointed out. Although 80,000 arrests are made statewide by all law enforcement agencies, Hough says this represents only a small percentage of the offenders.

The toll-free number will be in operation 24 hours a day for citizens to report intoxicated drivers. This is the first time a hotline has been used in the state to increase the opportunity for removing drunk drivers from the roadways. To report a suspected drunk driver, citizens can call 1-800-525-5555. They should provide the location and direction of travel, vehicle description,

license number, and be able to describe the type of erratic driving observed.

Although this program is new to Michigan, ten other states are currently using this concept. Funding for the program is provided through a federal grant.

## Jump Rope For Heart

More than 20,000 students at over 300 schools will be jumping rope between now and the end of April in Jump Rope for Heart to benefit the American Heart Association of Michigan.

Students participating in the

event get pledges for the time their team jumps and earn prizes such as shoelaces, wrist watches, T-shirts, back packs, warm-up suits, and AM-FM pocket radios with headphones.

Schools earn educational materials and athletic equipment based on the amount of money turned in. Among the dozens of items which can be earned are: basketball nets, unicycles, first aid kits, tumbling mats, hurdles, weights, CPR manikins, films, video cameras, computers, and playground equipment.

Last year's event raised more than \$470,000 for Heart Association programs, and this

year's goal is to meet or exceed that amount.

The event, sponsored for the fifth consecutive year by the Michigan Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance, will raise funds to help support Heart Association programs such as research, stroke clubs, and community education program's.

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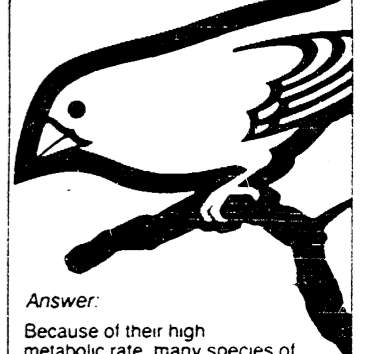
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## QUESTION OF THE WEEK

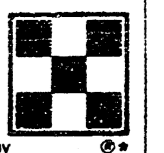
