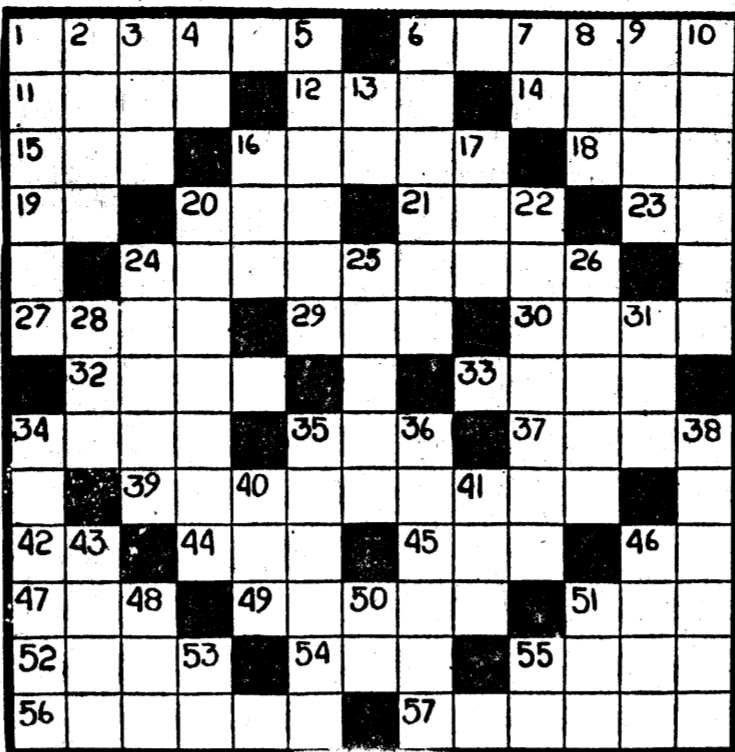

HOW TO SOLVE A CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

CHOOSING A WIFE

Annual Oyster Feast Held by English Town

The oyster feast at Colchester, England, which is held on October 21, dates back centuries and centuries, in fact, to the time of the ancient Britons. Julius Caesar, after his conquest of the eastern counties of England, founded a town on the site of the present Colchester, and the export of oysters to Rome became the chief industry. During the reign of Richard I (1189), the monarch granted a charter to the citizens giving them the sole right for oyster fishing off a large part of the coast. In order to keep the size of the oysters up to standard, a silver oyster was cast, which now reposes in the town hall, and it is illegal to sell them smaller than the model. As the fame of Colchester's oysters spread, it became customary to invite well-known people from all over the country. The ceremony takes place at the town hall, at the expense of the mayor. The duke of York was the guest of honor last year, which witnessed an epoch-making event. For the first time in Colchester's history the feast was presided over by a lady, for the city's civic head was a mayoress.
