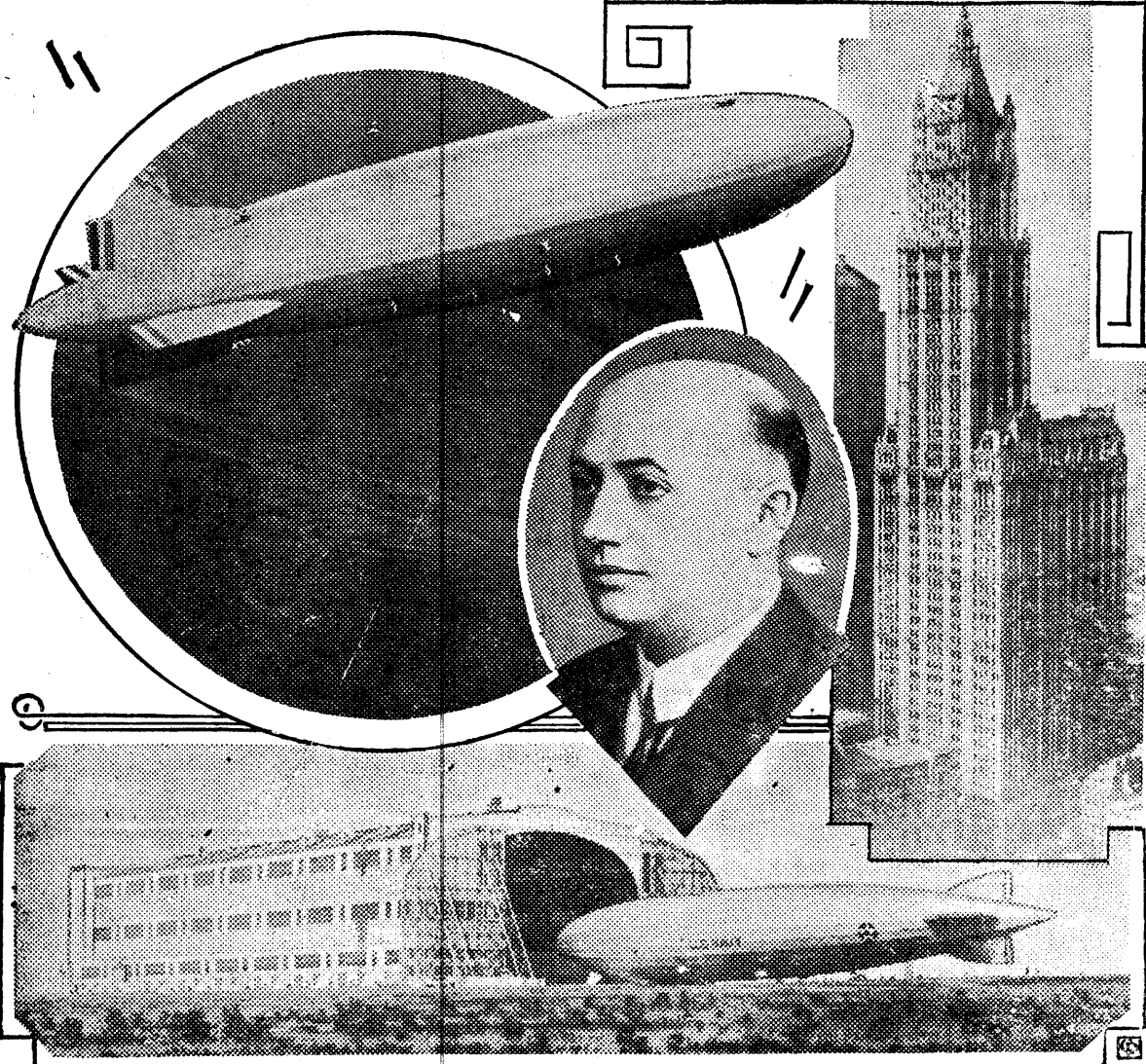

## Five Cities Seek Uncle Sam's New Dirigibles



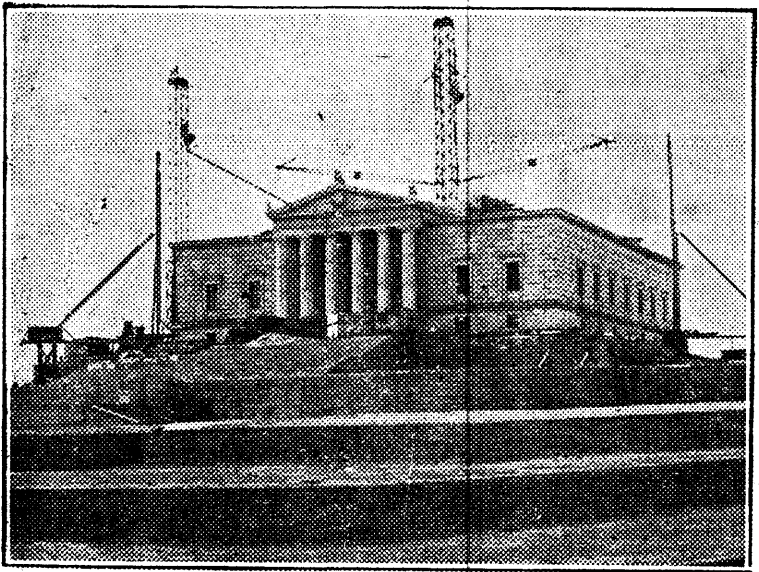
Uncle Sam is waiting for construction on two new giant dirigibles to begin, but as yet the ships are homeless. Baltimore, Md., Cleveland, O., Akron, O., Los Angeles and San Diego, Cal., are bidding for the lighter-than-air plant. The ships are to be built by a rubber company of Akron, O. The concern submitted the prize winning design in government competition. Dr. Karl Arnstein, inset, engineer, is largely responsible for the design. A gigantic hangar, 400 feet longer than the one which covers the Los Angeles at Lakehurst, N. J., also must be constructed. ## 107 BUSHELS OF CORN TO THE ACRE

A production of 107 bushels of shelled corn to the acre sounds like a story from the tall corn state, but Paul C. Clement, of Britton, grew that amount in 1927 on his Lenaewee county farm.

Mr. Clement won the 1927 Michigan five-acre corn growing contest sweepstakes prize and first prize for region 1. Roscoe Waldron placed second in region 1, with a yield of 99 bushels per acre; Otto Wegner, Riga, with 93 bushels per acre, was third, and George Bruce, Britton, with 86 bushels, was fourth.

In region 2, the placings were: Fritz Mantey, Fairgrove, first; P. P. Ferden and Son, Chesaning, second; Max Desback, St. Louis, third; and George Kohn, Fenwick, fourth.

**Fertilizers Important.** George Rae, Bay City, was first in region 3; and Burdette Crandall, Bellaire, was second.

Commercial fertilizers played an important part in the production of high yields. Twenty-three of 29 men on the prize winning list used commercial fertilizers in producing their crops of corn.

Seven men on the list planted their corn following sweet clover; alfalfa preceded the corn planted by five of the winners, and either June or Mammoth clover sod was used as corn ground by four of the men.

## Tendency Toward Fertilizer Use

A marked tendency toward the use of fertilizers with higher percentages of plant food is apparent as the result of a campaign put on by the fertilizer industry and various agricultural agencies.

Some of the reasons for this are obvious. Less material is required in the high-analysis products. The fertilizer manufacturer saves in the number of bags he has to furnish, and the farmer makes a corresponding gain in hauling a smaller number of bags to the farm and to the field. Smaller storage space is adequate, whether in the manufacturer's warehouses or in the farmers' barns or sheds. Both producer and consumer save in labor involved in handling the smaller bulk. Freight charges represent one of the principal savings. Even if it is desired to apply the fertilizer in more dilute form it is often possible to arrange for this on the farm using a farm waste to supplement the fertilizer.

Formerly some fertilizers were sold with as little as 10 per cent of available plant food. Now many states have set a minimum of 14 per cent and are endeavoring to shut out some fertilizers, the formulas of which indicate that they would not be particularly suitable for the crops and soils of the state.

Many concentrated fertilizers are now available. To be classed as a concentrated fertilizer, according to chemists of the United State Department of Agriculture, the mixture must have 30 per cent or more available plant food. Mixtures have been made of such high concentration that they carry 70 per cent of active plant food.

## Yellow Grosbeaks Pay Visit to Alma

A number of Alma people, among them Mrs. Harley Glass, Miss Frances Stitt and Mr. Stephen L. Bennett, have been interested this week in watching several flocks of birds which are making themselves quite at home in the community. It is evident that they are strangers here and upon inquiry Prof. McCurdy of the College states that they are known as the Yellow Grosbeak and are very rare in this part of the country. Their native habitat is northwest of the Rocky mountains and in northwestern Canada and they do not as a rule come this far east.

Ornithologists think that some flocks may have been lost from the main group as their presence here is very out of the ordinary. Several pairs have been seen in the Upper Peninsula, but this seems to be their first visit to lower Michigan.

In response to many inquiries as to how the corn-borer appropriation of \$10,000,000 will be expended, the United States Department of Agriculture states that about half of this sum will be paid to individual farmers to reimburse them in part or entirely for extra work which they may have done to comply with the clean-up regulations.

## Profit in Sheep For U. P. Farmer

The transformation of millions of idle acres in the upper peninsula into revenue producing and taxpaying lands through the medium of the sheep industry was the happy message Monday of Vernon Freeman of the animal husbandry department of Michigan State college in a brief but vivid address before the Iron River Lions club.

Sheep, explained the speaker, are especially adapted to the upper peninsula region by reason of feed, climate, and cheap pasture, and the need of a stabilizing industry. Fed on roughage or grass crops which the upper peninsula grows abundantly and little grain, with only moderate capital needed for buildings, sheep, said the speaker, beckons opportunity both to the man who goes into the industry on a large scale and to the farmer who takes over a small herd as a side-line to intensive dairying and poultry raising.

Plunging in the sheep business, the sheep specialist cautioned against, advising rather a small start with flocks somewhere between 25 and 200 and a gradual growth once success has been achieved.

For, exclaimed Mr. Freeman, one man with the same opportunities will succeed while his neighbor fails, and before any sizable investment is made, it is best to test the adaptability of the sheepman.

Sheep raising, Freeman explained, is one means by which the upper peninsula farmer can utilize to good advantage his large timothy production for although sheep thrive better on leguminous crops, they do well on timothy and other grass crops. Sheep, he said, require relatively little labor and with sound merchandising methods and ordinary care bring a good return at the prevailing market prices.

Analyzing the sheep market and its susceptibility to cycles, Mr. Freeman predicted a strong market for several years and a degree of safety for the man who bought breeders in reasonable numbers at this time.

He asked for an open season on bear, now closed in Michigan, saying the bear was an enemy of sheep and that because of its sly nature, it never would become a tourist asset. Mr. Freeman conducted a successful meeting in the farmers' room of the city hall in Iron River last night after a visit to sheep farms Monday. He will conduct another meeting today at Swan Lake before leaving the county.

## Ionia Co-op to Sell Its Output Through Livestock Exchange

Plans have been started by the newly organized Ionia County Co-operative Livestock Shipping association to conduct a survey of shipping and selling facilities in Ionia, with a view to determining a better way of serving the shippers of the county.

It is possible new stockyards will be constructed and that a change in feeding methods will be adopted. The association also has decided to try selling its shipments through the Michigan Livestock exchange instead of regular commission merchants.

A trial shipment will be sent the Michigan group, which is a co-op commission organization specializing in selling for co-operative shipping groups.

Storm conditions will most likely continue over Friday, but clearing weather will appear over most parts of the state by the end of the week.

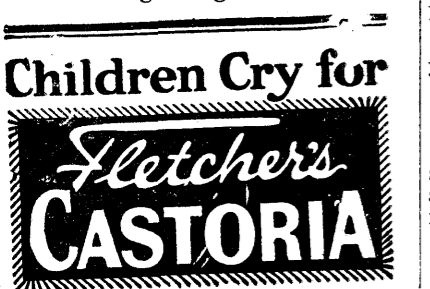

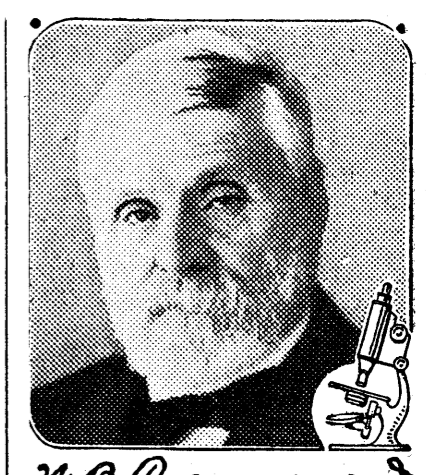

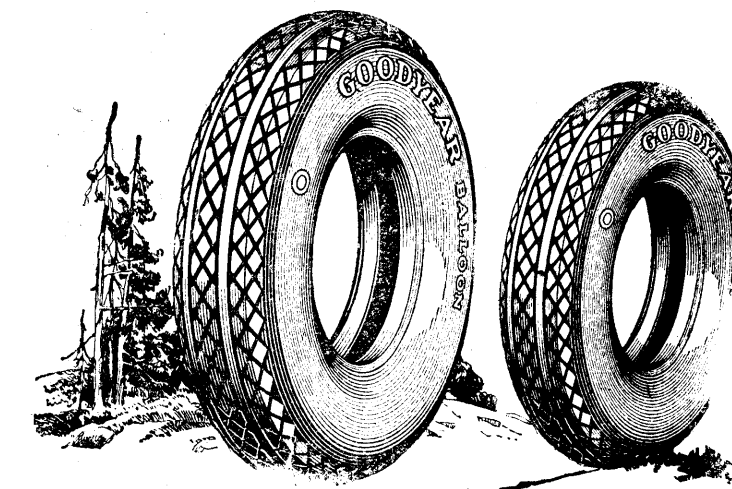
