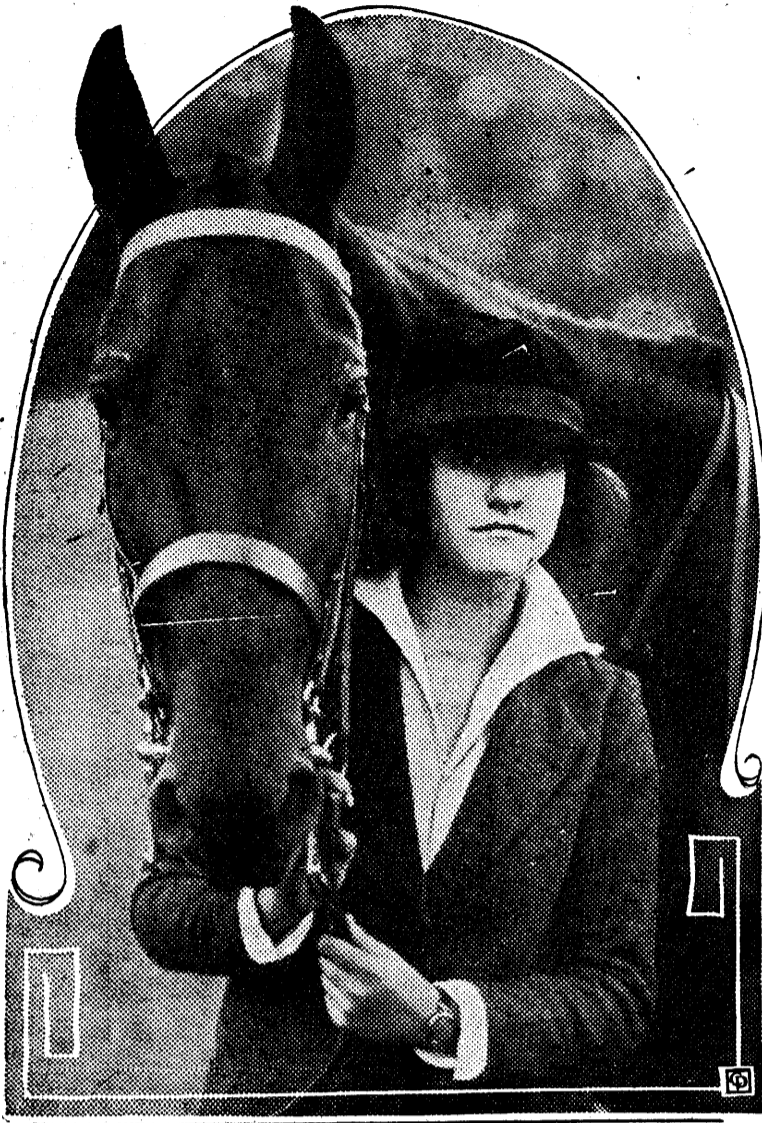

Ousted Police Chief Arrested

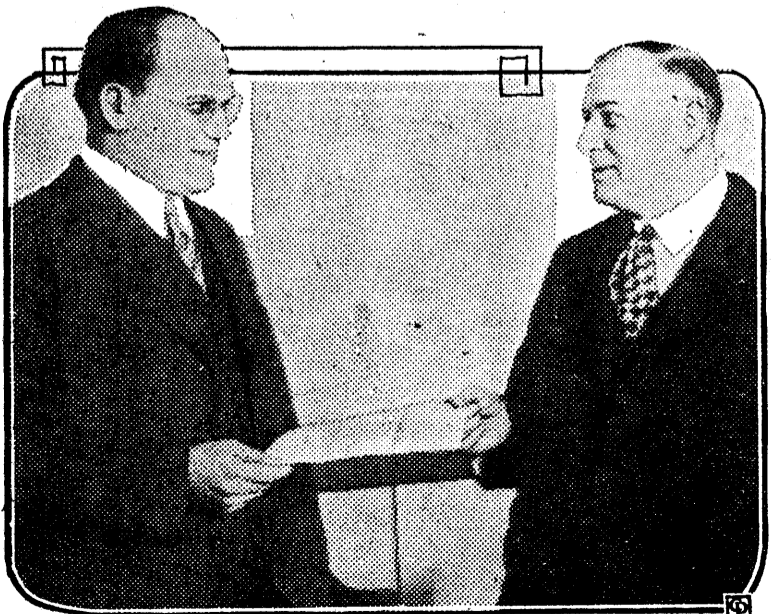

DISKING NOT AS EFFECTIVE AS PLOWING

Plowing corn stubble for oats to control the European corn borer, rather than disking them in, increase yields, according to reports submitted by 40 growers of certified seed oats to the Michigan Crop Investment Association.

The reports show that six growers of Worthy oats, who plowed under corn stubble, averaged 64.7 bushels of oats per acre, while eight growers who disked in average only 61.3 bushels. Worthy oats are recommended for heavy soils which are characteristic of the Thumb, Monroe, Lenawee and other counties.

Using Wolverine oats, 19 growers, who plowed under corn stubble, averaged 54.1 bushels of oats per acre, while seven growers, who disked in, averaged only 52.4 bushels. Wolverine oats are a desirable variety for the lighter loams and upland soils. Their average yield is lower than the Worthy variety, as Wolverine oats are generally grown on less fertile soils.

The report indicates that an increase in oats yields in favor of plowing over disking corn stubble may possibly not offset the cost of plowing. However, in view of the corn borer menace, plowing has come to be looked upon as the most practical control measure. If the seed bed is prepared thoroughly, the yield of grain should be as much or more than had the corn stubble land been disked without plowing.

Squash Products Co. Reports Good Year

The Michigan Squash Products Co. of Bad Axe reports that its entire output has been sold and delivered. The crop and market were good, Fred Rapson, secretary, reports.

The firm is on a sound financial basis with all obligations paid, the secretary states.

In a letter from a friend in Spokane, Wash., Mr. Rapson recently learned of efforts that are being made to extend the squash business east to the Atlantic coast.

The letter follows: "I am in hope of getting the squash business further east than you are. I want to get it along the Atlantic coast. I have a friend in Georgia who is the head of the Farmers' Union and I think I can get him to help down there.

"I am thinking more about the number of babies nursing bottles than I am in the amount of wealth I am going to get out of it. There are millions of babies in the United States that are suffering because of a lack of milk. You people had ought to realize that there is far more to them in the raising of this squash and feeding it to livestock and bringing up the fertility of the land than there is in shipping the squash. I would like very much to have you join with me and take this squash business into Europe, where it is so badly needed.

"The company has some contracts to let yet. Also a quantity of seed for the large or marblehead squash to sell. A sum of \$1.60 will plant one acre. And it will grow more and better cow feed for fall and early winter than anything you can raise."

Gratiot Herd Owner Chooses Trade Name For His Holsteins

Glen Boyd, whose herd of purebred Holstein dairy cattle is well known in St. Louis, has recently chosen a trade name to identify his herd, according to an announcement made by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, which registered the name for Mr. Boyd. "Jolimont" is the name chosen as a part of the name of each individual animal in the herd.

All registered Holsteins have a name and number, the name usually indicating the ancestral blood lines.

This prefix trade mark will be used by Mr. Boyd as a further means of identifying individual animals by indicating the farm where the animal was bred. Since the system was established more than 15,000 Holstein breeders have reserved trade mark names.

32,000,000 Bushel Potato Crop for Michigan Seen

Michigan farmers intend to have larger acreages of all the important crops except hay for harvest this year, according to the annual forecast survey made by Herbert E. Powell, commissioner of the State Department of Agriculture, and Verne H. Church, agricultural statistician for Michigan. The report also showed that in most instances farmers throughout the United States are planning crop acreages that will exceed last year.

Potato growers throughout the country intend to increase the potato acreage again this year. The intentions for the United States are 111.9 per cent, for the North Central group of states 113.5 per cent, and for Michigan 110 per cent. There was a 16 per cent increase in the Michigan acreage last year, but the production turned out the shortest since 1916 because of the small yield per acre. If Michigan farmers actually plant this increased acreage and an average yield results, the out-turn will be a 32 million bushels crop. If the indicated increase for the United States is carried out, and an average yield results, a total production of 411 million bushels will be obtained, which will be another crop above normal consumption requirements.

There is a prospective increase in spring wheat acreage in Michigan of 35 per cent. However, the intentions for the North Central group of states is for a spring wheat acreage only 98.3 per cent as large as last year.

The intentions report for the grain crops in Michigan shows increases amounting to 3 per cent for corn, 2 per cent for oats and 40 per cent for barley. In the United States an increase of 2.8 per cent is indicated for the corn acreage and 23.9 per cent for the barley acreage, but for the country as a whole farmers intend to plant only 98.6 per cent as much acreage to oats. If the intentions of the farmers in the North Central group of states are carried out, this area will have 1.7 per cent more corn, 28.2 per cent more barley and slightly less oats acreage this year than last.

The intentions inquiry further indicated that Michigan farmers plan to increase their bean acreage about 15 per cent. This increased acreage with an average yield will mean a total production about 35 per cent larger than the average yield for the past ten years, or 45 per cent larger than last year's short crop.

Throughout the United States the intentions are to cut less tame hay this year than last with a decrease in Michigan amounting to 2 per cent.

Holland Rabbit, Cavie Breeders, Organize

The Greater Holland Rabbit and Cavie association is the name of a new concern that has been launched at Holland with a membership of 37. The object of the association is to promote better breeding of rabbits and cavies and other pet stock.

The officers are: President, Dewey Jaarsma; vice president, Nick Brouwer; secretary, Rev. R. Roozeboom of East Holland; treasurer, Marvin Albers, and directors, Judge D. Mieras and Dale Johnson of Grand Rapids and Floyd Taylor and John Morley.

Meetings will be held monthly. Indications point to a large membership.

CARTON MAY HEAD FARM DELEGATION

A. C. Carton, director of the state bureau of agricultural industry, probably will head a delegation of Michigan farmers which will go to Washington to appear before the agricultural committee in the house, urging congress to pass the Purnell bill providing for an appropriation of \$10,000,000 to fight the European corn borer.

The appropriation would be distributed largely in the infested areas next spring in connection with the clean up work before the borers develop into moths. On the basis of \$2 an acre for cleaning up the 1927 corn acreage, Michigan farmers would receive about \$1,600,000.

Farm leaders in this state have been aroused by the attitude of Secretary of Agriculture Jardine in apparently opposing the Purnell bill. Jardine, it is reported, would limit federal efforts to "control" the borer by the enforcement of quarantine lines and conducting research work to find ways to "live with the pest." If congress also assumes this attitude farm leaders in Michigan believe it will only tend to speed the day when the borers will infest the entire corn belt and the present agricultural production plan will be disorganized.

Cows of low or medium production are not thought to require so long a dry period as high producers. Such cows should be dry a month or six weeks, provided they are in a good state of flesh. Thin cows may need a somewhat longer period. High producers may require two months or more to permit them to get in proper condition for calving.

Seaweed Harvest of Importance in Japan

Japanese soldiers do not give much trouble to the quartermaster's department. In the field they are capable of great endurance on a diet of dried rice, dried fish, dried seaweed, and pickled plums. The seaweed is wrapped round the rice and used as a "relish" to it. Given a tiny fire, a stewpan, and the rations mentioned, they are perfectly content, whatever the weather and however long the marches.

Seaweed is grown specially for food purposes, being cultivated with as much care as any other crop. After the typhoon season, the women may be seen bearing great loads of young trees which have been stripped of their leaves, though all the small branches are left intact. These are drawn into the weed on the shore, acres of brushy saplings being arranged in long, parallel rows where the tide ebbs over them twice daily.

Gradually, the green fernlike weed collects on the branches, and flourishes there until the farmers harvest it. It is then carefully picked over and dried for future use.

Curative Power Long Ascribed to Flowers

The forget-me-not was formerly known as scorpion grass, because the flower buds were thought to resemble the coiled-up serpent, and our forefathers, believing in the doctrine of signatures, supposed this to indicate that they would cure venomous stings. Vying with the forget-me-not in its sentimental associations is the lily of the valley, which also blooms in May, and is indeed sometimes called the May-lily. In the old herbalist's heyday it seems also to have vied with the forget-me-not in curative properties. In the world of legend, however, the forget-me-not seems to have a distinct advantage, for whereas an angel scattered them for us, the lily of the valley sprang from the tears of a mere mortal, Eve, as she left the Garden of Eden.—Chicago Journal.

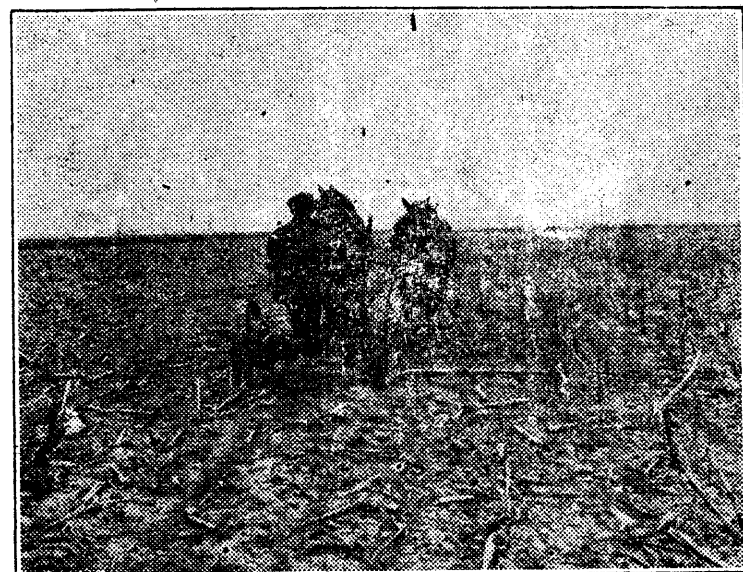
Language of Diplomacy

Fragments of Lott's Good Legal Evidence

While crude, the representation serves as evidence that the bagpipe was in use during the 14 centuries which elapsed between the time the terra cotta figures discovered by De Morgan were molded and the carving in the rock at Takht-i-Bostan.

Gulf Stream's Width Put at Fifty Miles

The Gulf stream flows out of the Gulf of Mexico between the coast of Florida and the Bahamas, and then northeastwardly along the American coast. Its width, in the narrowest portion, is about fifty miles, and its depth some 2,000 feet. After it has passed between the Bermudas and the coast of Carolina it is divided into several streams, about 100 fathoms deep and altogether 150 miles wide. Its temperature up to this point is several degrees warmer than that of the surrounding ocean. Beyond the 40th parallel of north latitude and the meridian 60 degrees west, the Gulf stream can no longer be distinguished from the rest of the ocean drift by temperature, motion, color, saltness or otherwise. It has no further separate existence, but is lost in the general drift of warm water from the southwestern Atlantic toward Europe—a general phenomenon having little or nothing to do with the Gulf stream proper.

Combination More Than Fifty Per Cent Good

In a sketch of John Hay by Charles F. Thwing, president emeritus of Western Reserve university, included in his book, "Guides, Philosophers and Friends," is this Lincoln story told to Doctor Thwing by Hay: "I know that most of the anecdotes told about Lincoln are apocryphal," said Mr. Hay, "but this one is true. In the campaign which led, as it proved, to his election, I was out with Mr. Lincoln on the 'stump.' 'We had a reception given to us in one of the cities of our campaign. In the line there came up a man who, getting close to Mr. Lincoln, said: 'Mr. Lincoln, down our way, in Buffalo, we kind o' think if we can have you and God we can pull the old thing through.' 'Getting close, himself, to the man, Mr. Lincoln replied: 'I kind o' think you are more than half right!'"—Kansas City Star.

Blessing the Beasts

A quaint ceremony is that still obtaining in some parts of Normandy, the benediction des bestiaux. The oxen and the draft horses are assembled in front of the church. There may also be a bullock or two and perhaps some cows. The procession of peasants, clad in their very best, is sues from the church to the sound of a chant that is droned by the priest. The venerable cure sprinkles a few drops of water on the heads of the beasts and when all the animals have received the benediction the next feature of the ceremony is to place at the pedestal of the cross facing the church certain bundles tied in coarse linen. These bundles contain bread and salt, which are to be given to those beasts not able to attend the ceremony, says the Washington Star.

Power of Love

Once when John Ruskin and Thomas Carlyle were discussing the literature of their day, the latter said to his companion: "Can you tell me why it is that works on subjects of vital interest to the race, splendidly written by men of profound scholarship, command scarcely sufficient sale to pay the cost of publishing; while trashy novels, false to history, false to philosophy and false to the facts of human experience, and altogether lacking in literary merit, will sell by scores of thousands?"

After a short pause, Ruskin replied: "There is but one explanation of that fact, but the explanation is all-sufficient; the novel has love in it and the other has not."—Scribner's Magazine.

Bagpipes in Spain

Specimens of bagpipes are found on old Spanish manuscripts. In the beautiful volume of the "Cantigas di Santa Maria," which was made in the Thirteenth century of King Alphonso the Wise, there are 51 separate figures of musicians. These form an introduction to the canticles. There are three pipers among them with bagpipes. Another Spanish manuscript of the end of the Fifteenth century, illustrated by a Flemish artist for Queen Isabella, shows many musical instruments, among which are bagpipes.

Relic of Indian Art

A relief of the old Mathura school of Indian art is in the possession of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. It consists of a thin slab of red sandstone, carved on both sides. It is a pediment decorated with a repeating ornament of three varieties, the same on each side of the slab, and was probably part of the main or only entrance to a temple which may have been entirely of stone, but more likely of brick except for the doorway.

Bark Vital Part of Tree

The stem of a tree, also called trunk and bole, is the main axis extending from the roots to the crown, or to the tip in case of an unbranched stem. Tree stems range from long to short, straight to crooked and from erect to prostrate. An examination of a cross-section of a stem will show bark, wood and pith, says the American Tree Association. In the central part of the stem is the pith. About it is the wood, which in many trees can be divided into the darker heartwood and the lighter sapwood. Between the wood and the bark is a thin layer known as the cambium. This is the most vital part of a tree, for it is here that all new wood and bark are made up.

British Coal Abundant

For her size, Great Britain has more and better coal than any other country in the world. The coal seams, lying one below another to an unknown depth, not infrequently cropping out at the surface, are proof that tropical conditions once prevailed in the latitude of these islands. The district which is now Great Britain was connected in primeval times with the continent, and the coal of England doubtless runs under the channel and the southern part of the North sea, continuing in the coal fields of northern France, Belgium and Flanders.

Baseball's Origin

Baseball was known in various forms in the East for years before it received organized recognition, but its birthplace is a matter of dispute. Philadelphia takes the credit as far back as 1833, and New York claims that its Washington club, organized in 1843, was the first exponent of the actual game. Baseball as a national game really came into existence in 1858, with the formation of a National Association of Baseball Players, including the clubs of New York and vicinity.

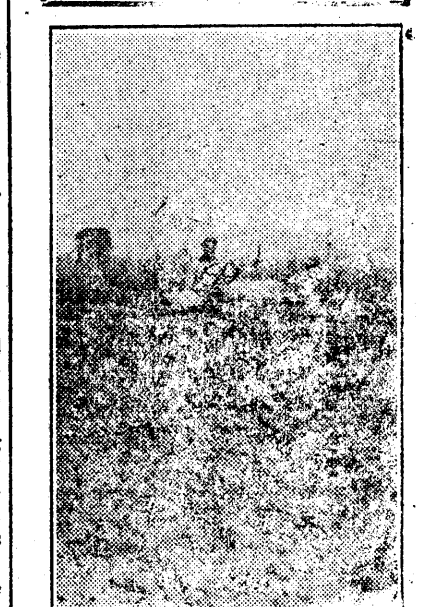

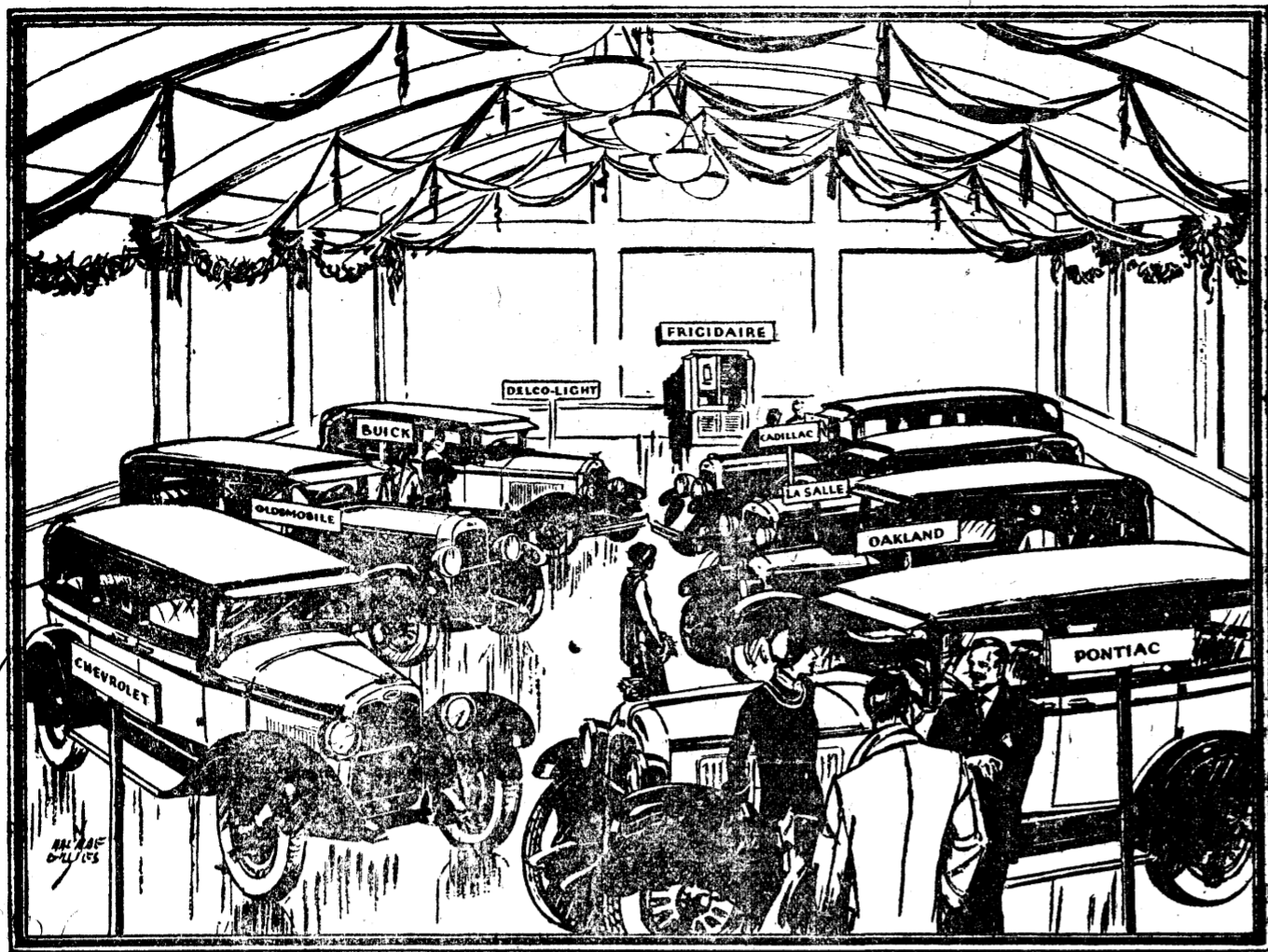
