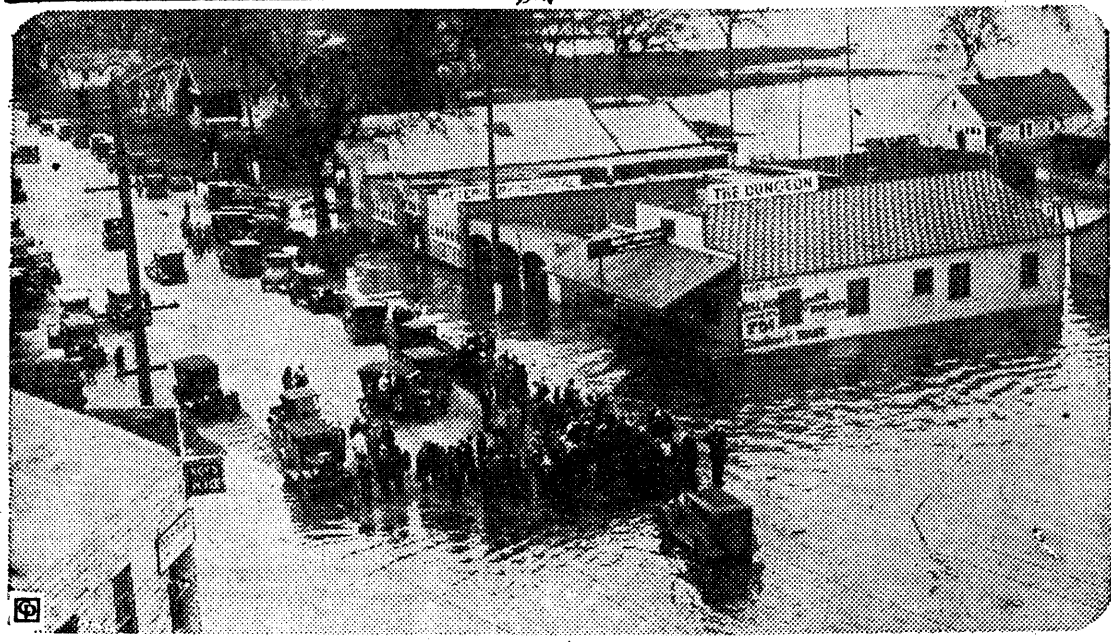




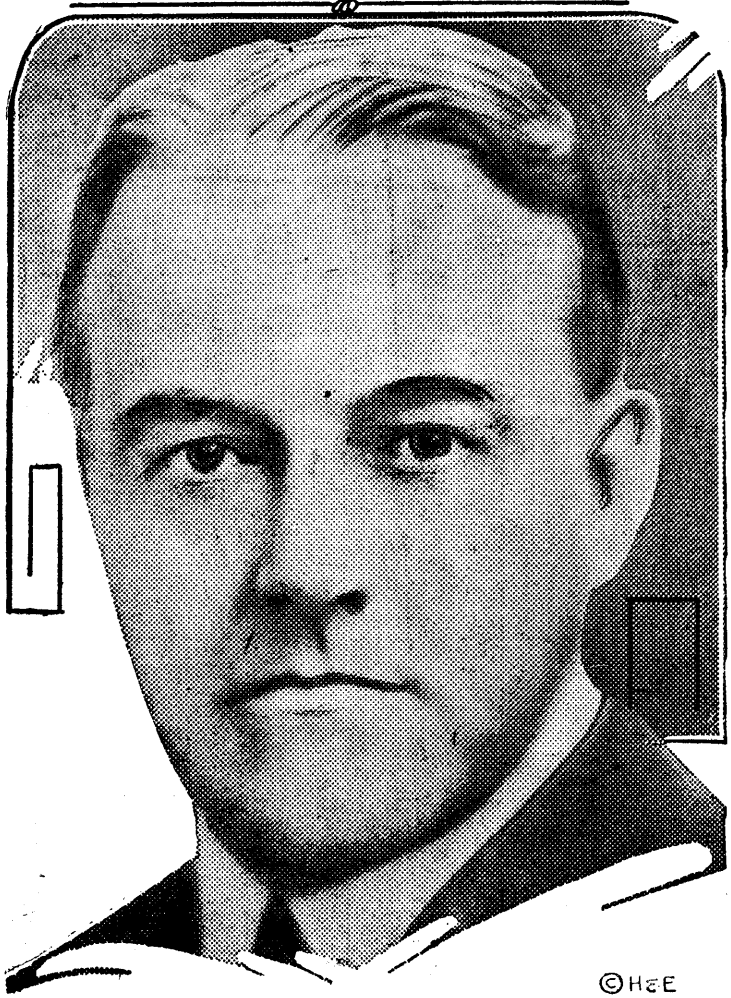

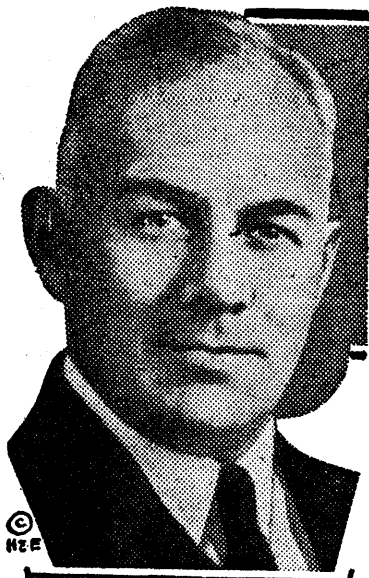
## Willis Death Stuns Ohio

Death of United States Senator Frank B. Willis, who collapsed suddenly while preparing to make a speech at his home town, Delaware, O., not only stunned Ohio, but has thrown the state's presidential primary election, April 24, into chaos. Senator Willis had been contesting for Republican delegates with Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover. Senator Willis' name already is on the ballots. The death will also change Ohio's political complexion in the senate. As Ohio's governor, A. Vic Donahey, is a Democrat, the appointee to fill out Senator Willis' term until the November election will be a Democrat, it is assumed. Ohio now will elect two United States senators in November.

## Star Woman Coach



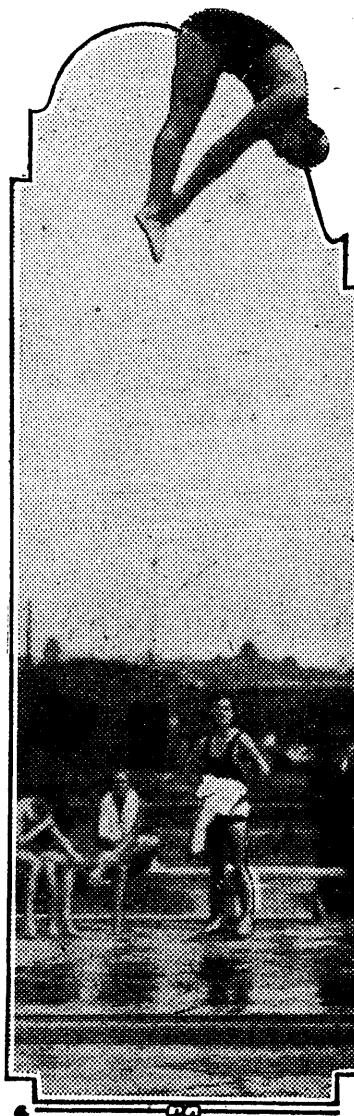

## RAM LAMBS ARE NOT WANTED IN TERMINAL MARKET

One Michigan farmer lost \$42.70 that could have been saved by an extra hour of work in his flock of lambs, according to figures furnished to Michigan State college specialists by the manager of the Gladwin Farmers' Co-operative Livestock Shipping Association.

This farmer shipped 24 lambs of which five sold at the top price of \$13.50 a hundred weight on the terminal market, and 19 sold as rams at \$10 a hundred. V. A. Freeman, animal husbandry specialist, M. S. C., says that proper flock management when the lambs were 10 days old would have resulted in a top price for the entire shipment.

On a carload of lambs shipped from Gladwin, 39 out of 214 lambs sold as rams for \$3.50 a hundred weight less than the price received for the rest of the carload. The lambs selling at the lower price averaged 79 pounds in weight, which is the ideal market weight.

Consumers of mutton pay high prices for cuts from the loins and hind quarters of the lamb carcass, but the remainder of the meat sells much cheaper. Ram lambs develop forequarters and necks, which go into the low priced cuts. Buyers penalize the farmer who ships this class of lambs to market.

Some ram lambs do not develop the heavy forequarters before being sold and these bring a top price. Discrimination in prices against other lambs that have become masculine in appearance sometimes leads farmers to accuse buyers of unfair practices.

## Motion Pictures Are Taken of Notorious Barnyard Underworld

The pests and parasites which menace livestock and threaten the welfare of farm families are exposed in their sinister roles in the new United States Department of Agriculture educational motion picture, "The Barnyard Underworld."

The new film, one reel in length, tells the story of a slipshod farmer and his insanitary barnyard. His livestock fall victims to the attacks of disease breeding worms, mites and lice which infest the sanctuary in his carelessness has provided for them. A veterinarian orders a thorough raid upon the haunts of these creatures of the "barnyard underworld" which threaten disaster to the farmer. A general clean-up, disinfecting and rebuilding campaign follows and in the end the farmer reaps the rewards of his vigilance. There is also a thread of romance in the story which has a happy ending.

Copies of United States Department of Agriculture films are available for loan without charge other than the cost of transportation, which must be assumed by the borrowers. Prospective users of the film should apply for bookings to the office of motion pictures, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

## State's Deer Went Through Winter in Best of Condition

Deer in Michigan suffered very little during the winter, representatives of the State Department of Conservation have reported. Apparently, natural food has been plentiful, for the animals appear to be sleek and well fed. One report comes from the large deer yard near Hulbert in the Upper Peninsula.

While there are a large number of deer in this yard, only two animals were seen to be in poor condition, and this was due to the fact that one had been shot through the jaw by some hunter during the past hunting season, and another had a leg partly shot away.

## Samuel Odell Has New Champion in His Herd

The Jersey herd at Highland farm, owned by Samuel Odell, chairman of the state utilities commission, has added another champion to its long list.

Fauvic's Princess Rostelle, 675,639, a heifer, started test at the age of 1 year and 11 months and in the following 305 days she produced 422.26 pounds of butter fat and 9,497 pounds of milk. She was with calf 208 days while making this test and qualified for a silver medal in class AAA, in addition to the state class championship in the yearling class for both butter fat and milk.

## Hen Industry Third In United States

Southern farmers are very familiar with the "Billion dollar bandit," better known to them as the Boll weevil, and most of them do not realize that the losses caused by the depredations are being largely offset by the comely hen.

With more than a billion dollars a year to the credit of the business she creates, the American hen now stands third in the branches of the livestock industry. She accounted for about sixteen per cent of the total value of all livestock and its products for 1926, and only the dairy industry with forty per cent and the swine industry with twenty-two per cent rank higher. Dr. John R. Mohler of the United States Department of Agriculture, addressing the convention of veterinarians, reminded his hearers that poultry diseases were important because the American hen is responsible for more than one-third of the world's supply of poultry and eggs. The American hen collectively lays at the rate of about 760 eggs a second or 2,000,000,000 dozen eggs a year.

## Mestamaker Heads Van Buren Beekeepers

H. C. Mestamaker has been chosen president and Charles E. Peper, secretary and treasurer of the Van Buren County Beekeepers Association, which was organized under the direction of County Farm Agent William F. Johnston.

By-laws were adopted under which the following directors were elected: H. C. Mestamaker, Breedsville; Charles E. Peper, Bloomingdale; C. W. Higgins, W. D. Davis, C. E. Lockman, Paw Paw; H. B. Christianson, Decatur, and Ora Hoshier, Breedsville.

Kenneth W. Atkinson, deputy state inspector of apiaries, in speaking on bee inspection in Michigan, said in Van Buren county in 1927 2,293 colonies were inspected in 364 yards. Of these 804 colonies in 168 yards had American foul-brood and 274 colonies in 125 yards had cross combs.

## Eaton Group Formed To Fight Corn Borer

The committee to take charge of the fight against the corn borer in Eaton county has been organized under the direction of Clair C. Taylor, county agricultural agent. George Garms of Bellevue was selected to act as supervisor of the county. He is to be assisted in the work by Chairman Joseph Lamie, Secretary J. H. Loucks and Mr. Taylor.

## COLD ROOM WILL BE BUILT AT U. OF M. TO STUDY ROAD SOILS

A cold room, for the study of sub-soil conditions, will be built in the highway engineering laboratories at the University of Michigan, Roger L. Morrison, associate professor of highway engineering, has announced. The room will be in the East Engineering building.

The breakups that occur each spring have long been an unsolved problem to the highway engineer. Surveys have been made of concrete roads and it is thought that in both gravel and hard surface roads the breakups and cracks that appear each year are due to sub-soil conditions.

To further research in this problem, the cold room will be built jointly by the university and the state highway department.

If a successful discovery is made, highway engineers say it will prove valuable to road builders.

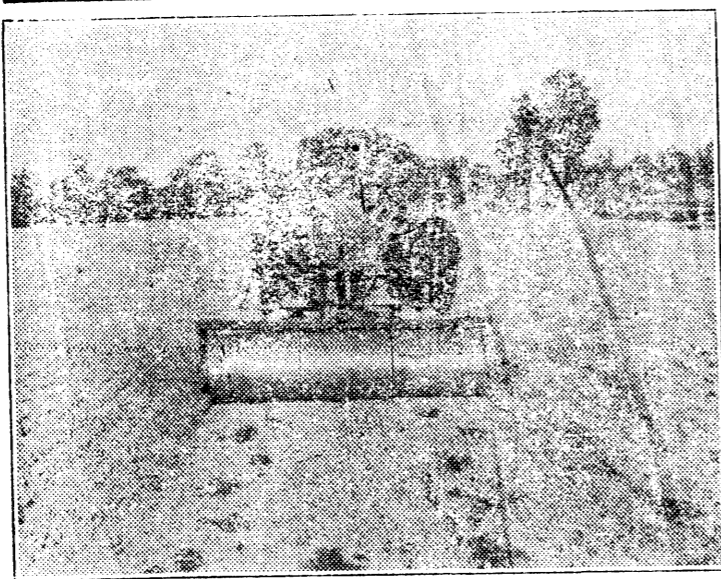

After corn stalks and stubble have been turned completely under, it is necessary that they be kept there. The surface must be kept clean so that the borers, when they come up, will not have any refuge to crawl into. **PRITCHARD'S WEATHER FORECAST**  
 GRAND RAPIDS MICHIGAN

**WEEK OF APRIL 22**  
 General Farm Outlook: Weather conditions for the greater part of Michigan during the week beginning April 22 will vary from cold to warm and from wet to dry. These conditions will affect the various counties in different ways, some feeling the effects of one kind of weather stronger than the others. Local cloud and wind directions will tell the reader just which will be apt to result and when. For the state as a whole we are of the opinion that temperatures will be lower than the normal and precipitation above. This condition will be good for most winter grains and pastures, but farm duties will be somewhat hindered.

Weather for Week: Moderate general rains are to be expected during the opening days of the week of April 22 in most parts of Michigan. With these storm conditions will be wind and all followed by a change to much colder.

Cool to cold weather and mostly fair skies are to be expected immediately following these storms. By Tuesday or Wednesday there will be more general rains that will probably last over Thursday in some eastern counties. However, we are looking for some fair weather in most sections of the state during Thursday, but which will soon turn again to cloudy and wet weather. This latter situation will continue over the balance of the week.

May Probabilities: It is our belief that for the greater part of the month of May in Michigan we may expect temperatures to range somewhat below the seasonal normal and that the precipitation will range above normal. If these conditions materialize, the cherry and some other fruit crops may be in danger. Oats may fail to germinate, although we believe this grain, along with barley, early potatoes, corn and some truck crops will not be planted as early as some years.
