Tramps occupied the M. E. church a few evenings since. Depot isn't good enough it seems.

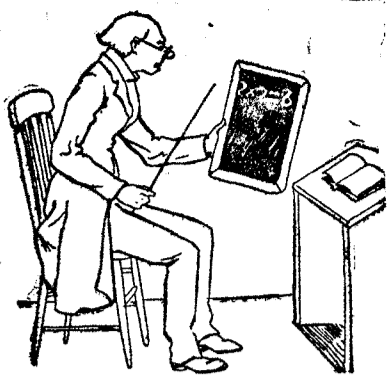

The bowl is of red-stone, 8 inches long, 4 1/2 inches high and weighs 14 ounces. It has the "slouch" mark, one nick. Prof. E. J. Freeman of Winona, Minn., when here saw it and pronounced it the genuine article, placing its value at \$368.
