## Councilman paves way for daily-fee track in Phoenix

PHOENIX, Ariz. - Thanks to the support of Cody Williams, Phoenix City Council member, District 8 will now be home to one of the state's new daily-fee golf courses when The Raven Golf Club at South Mountain opens next October.

The Raven, according to Panks, will be reminiscent of the rolling, traditional designs more common in the Midwest. Plans call for the planting of more than 2,100 large trees, including Aleppo, Mondale and Canary Island pines.

Tiffway 419 will be used on the tees, fairways and rough. The greens will be Tifdwarf Bermuda. Overseeding will be wall to wall with rye. The greens will be overseeded with bentgrass and poa trivialias

## Commerce City pursues muni work, American Links

COMMERCE CITY, Colo. -American Links Consulting of San Antonio, Texas, has been contracted by city officials here to perform advisory services and assist the city with development of a new municipal golf course, to be located north of the city and near the new Denver International Airport.

Design work on the course, expected to be named Buffalo Run, has been completed and the project is currently being bid by several prominent golf course construction contractors. Con-struction is scheduled to be underway in early spring 1995.

American Links was brought on board by Commerce City to assist with resolution of due diligence issues, as well as oversee bidding and construction of the project. Randy Trull, formerly of Wadsworth Golf Construction and president of American Links, expects construction of the golf course to be completed in October 1995.

Trull's most recent project was The Quarry Golf Club, a much heralded upscale, daily-fee golf course built in an abandoned rock quarry near San Antonio.

## Penn.'s Robinsons engage Fazio for Hartefeld National

Two well-known names in golf course design and development are involved in two ongoing projects in Pennsylvania.

Golf course architect Tom Fazio will be the designer of a \$6.5 million golf course to be built on a former 460-acre country estate off Pennsylvania Route 41 in New Garden Township.

Hartefeld National Golf Club, an 18-hole course set for 188 acres, is scheduled to open for play in May and is expected to be a showcase.

A \$1.5 million clubhouse and public restaurant are expected to open in February. The golf course is part of a master plan for 2,000 acres near the Delaware border. It is being built partly on land belonging to Charles Raskob Robinson, whose family has been involved for generations in various renovations and buildings that have become historic properties associated with artist's retreats and diplomatic headquarters.

In Reading, the future of a proposed 18-hole course near Lake Ontelaunee will depend on pending analysis of environ-mental and financial issues.
