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

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting of the Mid-Atlantic Superintendents Association will be held on the frosty slopes of the Beaver Creek Country Club on the 6TH day of June. The course will be open all day for golf, social hour will be from 5:30 to 6:30 then dinner and meeting will follow.



HOST

Bert Yingling helped design, survey and construct Beaver Creek Country Club which was started in 1958. He claims no degrees but has attended field days and turf conferences to keep up with the grasses, chemicals and etc.

He is married and has three children.

The golf course is 6388 yards long from the white tees and 6878 yards from the champion-ship tees.

MAINTENANCE PRACTICES

The greens are C-7 with some Poa Annua starting to infiltrate here and there. The tees are seeded to a Merion-K-31 mixture over Arlington Stolons. Fairways are a mixture (50-50) Merion-K-31. Fertilization hasn't been applied regularly on the fairways and we are starting to have a weed problem which we will have to spray for.

Greens are moved at 1/4", tees 1/2", and fairways at one (1) inch throughout the season.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Many years ago an Electrician was replacing a Toggle Switch, without turning off the main line circuit. I remarked to him, that I had a fear of electricity. His reply was, I feared it because I didn't understand it. By coincidence his reply was similiar to the words of Professor Robinson of the N.Y.C. University, in his book, "The Mind in the Making", (quote) "Doubt and Fear, are great Enemies of Knowledge". I suppose you could reverse this and say, "Knowledge is the Enemy of "Doubt and Fear". It is more natural to avoid areas where we may experience the most doubt. Rather than attempt to get all the knowledge that is available to us. Or to express it more simply, we tend to seek the line of least resistance. To extend your knowledge in new areas, is the first and foremost requirement for good leadership. This is self-evident and basic.

To safely replace the Toggle Switch it was necessary to separate the Positive from the Negative. Now this may be the clue on how to properly evaluate something in doubt, by comparing the positive and negative points. From this comparison you will have alternatives, and draw your conclusions from the facts, not just your opinions. This reminds me of a quotation from Elbert Hubbard, "The Recipe for Perpetual Ignorance, is to be satisfied with our Opinions, and content with our Knowledge".

Now we can easily remember when placing our hands on the light switch, we are bringing together the Positive and the Negative. We have the alternative at our finger tips, and on you will depend whether you choose to remain Negatively in the Shadows of Doubt, or Positively, in the brightness of the Light. The Light of extended Knowledge.

PROPOSED BY-LAW AMENDMENTS

Addition:

Article VI

Section D

A retiring director may not succeed himself as Director for a period of one year. He may, however, run for the position of an officer of the Association.

Change:

Article VIII

Section A

The initiation fees and annual dues for each class of membership for the following year shall be the sum fixed by July 1 of the current year. These fees and dues shall be fixed by the board of directors at a regular board meeting. Such dues shall be payable in advance. The membership year shall be January 1 through December 31.

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
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Mr. Gearge Cle Box 121 A Lutherville, N DON'T FORGET TO SET THE BRAKE and stop the motor when you leave the unit.

HANDLE GASOLINE WITH CARE - it is highly inflammable. Use an approved container.

DON'T REFUEL IF THE MOTOR IS RUNNING, or if it is hot, or if you are smoking.

NEVER RUN THE ENGINE IN AN ENCLOSED SHELTER; exhaust fumes can be fatal.

STAY ALERT to ground contours and hazards, such as holes, tree roots, or lawn litter.

LOOK WHERE YOU ARE GOING. Watch for pedestrians and traffic when near roads.

DISENGAGE POWER TO ATTACHMENT and stop the engine before making any adjustments.

REDUCE SPEED ON SLOPES AND SHARP TURNS to prevent tipping or losing control.

IF MOWER GETS STUCK in mod, etc., don't try to move machine without an operator.

SHUT OFF THE ENGINE before making any adjustments or repairs on unit.

DON'T TRY TO GET OFF the machine while it is running, as it might run away.

LOOSE FITTING CLOTHING can cause accidents by getting caught in mower parts.

WHEN DRIVING MOWER keep hands and feet away from moving parts.
