The second was a little more troubling as it was initiated by the PGA of America basically developing the platform that a PGA professional is the most "gualified" person to manage a golf facility. This statement alone is worth an article for the next newsletter. Anyway, the GCSAA is considering promoting the Superintendent professional directly to the decision makers, owners, operators, etc.
