Read These Instructions Carefully

Present yourself at ticket office any day between February 9-15 inclusive at least 30 minutes before train time.

Tell the ticket agent you are going to Buffalo to attend the National Greenkeepers' Convention and ask for a reduced fare convention certificate.

If your wife or children accompany you get certificates for them also.

Buy your full fare ticket to Buffalo—the reduced rate applies only on the return trip.

On arrival at Buffalo report at once to Harry A. Burkhardt, Chairman of the Registration Committee at the National Association of Greenkeepers of America. Registration Booth in the Golf Show.

Leave your certificate with him until Friday and if you are in good standing it will be validated by the Special Agent.

Call at the Registration Booth Friday and get your certificate properly validated.

When you buy your ticket home present your certificate to the ticket agent in Buffalo and you will get a full fare ticket for half fare. thereby saving you 25 per cent of your total railroad expense.

**T**OHN MORLEY, president of the National Association of Greenkeepers of America, in his customary progressive and farsighted way. has appointed a committee on Standards to serve during the ensuing year.

In his letter of appointment Mr. Morley says:

"I believe the time has come when our association should consider the adoption of certain standards to protect the golf clubs against inferior products which may be used in competition with standard articles. Therefore, I have decided to appoint a Committee on Standmen I can find who will act with me as chairman during the ensuing year as a help and protection to our member greenkeepers and their clubs.

"Personally, I believe the appointment of this committee will make a decided impression with the golf club officials and will serve as a warning to the trade that the association is alive and will not permit unmerited products to be foisted upon its member clubs. We have had the experience and I feel we should not shirk our responsibilities and I believe we may do something constructive to add to the standing and reputation of our association.
