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The Tulsa District Golf Association met at the Tulsa Country club, Tulsa, Oklahoma, March 17, 1932, and the following officers were elected:

The members of that association pledged themselves to cooperate with the greenkeepers of the Tulsa district in every way and at future meetings articles on the production and maintenance of fine turf grasses will be read and discussed for the benefit of the greenkeepers present at the meetings.

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The Oklahoma State Amateur Golf championship of 1932 will be played over the Indian Hills Country club of Tulsa, Oklahoma, May 23 to 27, 1932, inclusive. That announcement was made recently by the Oklahoma State Golf association at the conclusion of a meeting of directors held at the Oklahoma City Golf and Country Club early in April. It is believed that G. A. Shaner, chairman of the Green committee at Indian Hills will have the course in championship shape by that time. Mr. Shaner devotes a large portion of his time to the development of the greens and fairways and his progress has been most remarkable. Grover C. Zweifel is the greenkeeper.

The directors of the State Golf association voted to hold an annual handicap tournament at a number of its member clubs over the state, the proceeds to be used to finance the experimental grass greens station at the Tulsa Country Club, Tulsa.

Previously the U. S. G. A. (Green Section) has borne the expense of maintaining this station together with the Tulsa Country Club, however, it will be necessary to give the station more care than was given it last year.

Oscar Brown, greenkeeper at the Tulsa Country Club, has devoted a considerable portion of his time to building the turf garden and it has been a source of interest for greenkeepers over the entire state. A large number of well-known grasses used in the development of grass greens are represented here.

The Oklahoma City Golf and Country Club will be the scene of the 1932 Trans-Mississippi tournament and Greenkeeper Hankins of that club just about has his hands full. The Oklahoma City Club has only experienced about two seasons' actual play and like all new courses it is in need of changes. The greens and fairways are in good condition but there is some necssary construction work and Hankins is working feverishly to get the course in shape for the big show which will be staged the latter part of next June.
