

## For 1932—All Toro Trojan Mowers will be equipped with Scrapers on Rear Rollers

EVERY Golf Course Superintendent knows and has known for years that no fairway mower, regardless of make, can do a clean job of cutting when the rear roller is covered with accumulations of hard, crusty dirt.

On every course this is a daily problem. Worm casts and loose dirt picked up by the roller soon harden and form a studded cover that causes the mower to bump along the ground. The result is that streaks are left in the grass and the fairway takes on a scraggly appearance.



At this desk if you so desire you can pay your 1932 dues, get application blanks and be sure to notify them if you desire a ticket for the banquet.


