TURFGRASS CENTRE PLANS CONSTRUCTION



Construction is expected to begin later this year on the Guelph Turfgrass Institute research and information centre. Completion is slated for late spring 1992.

The centre, designed by Briestensky Architects Ltd. of Guelph, will be used for education, research and extension in the turfgrass industry. It will be located on a 53-acre site owned by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food adjacent to The Arboretum.

Fund-raising efforts, spearheaded by Clay Switzer, special adviser to the president and chair of the institute's fund-raising committee, have collected \$950,000 towards the \$1.5-million goal.

The major contributor, institute member "Mac" Frost, has donated \$500,000.

The centre will contain conference facilities for up to 60 people, public access to publications and computer-reference materials, a display area, a research laboratory and storage and office space.

Turfgrass research now being conducted at the Cambridge Research Station will be moved to the institute's new site over the next five years.

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
