The 1977 California Golf Course Superintendents' Institute is the last in a series of five symposiums which focus on all aspects of the role and responsibilities of the professional golf course superintendent.

If golf course superintendents are to play an important role in the design of new courses and the remodeling of old ones, they must have a clear understanding of the elements of golf course design. This year's institute focuses on all aspects of golf course design to enable superintendents to more effectively manage quality maintenance of their courses.

William B. Davis, environmental horticulturist with U.C. Cooperative Extension is program and Institute director. The program, developed in cooperation with Dr. John Madison, professor of Environmental Horticulture, Robert Muir Graves, golf course architect, and other speakers, will feature lectures and small group discussions. A certificate of completion is granted after each institute. Three quarter units of University Extension credit may also be obtained through successful completion of an examination at the end of the course. The tuition fee of \$250 covers instruction, study material, a copy of the proceedings, meals and lodging. Superintendents within commuting distance may request a reduced fee.

The Institute will be held at the Asilomar Conference Grounds, Pacific Grove, beginning at 4 p.m. January 9 and ending at noon January 14.

Enrollment is limited to golf course superintendents and no more than 70 applicants will be accepted. Applications will be processed in the order received and must be received no later than December 15, 1976.
